REGISTRATION NOTICE FOR GENERAL NOVEMBER ELECTION

TUESDAY, NOV. 8th, 1932
To the Qualified Electors of the Township of Farmington, County of Oakland, State of Michigan.

Notice is hereby given that, in conformity with the Michigan Election Law, I, the undersigned Township Clerk, will, upon any day, except Sunday and a legal holiday, the day of any regular election, receive for registration the name of any legal voter in said Township not already registered who may apply to me personally for such registration. Provided, however, that I can receive no names for registration during the time intervening between the Second Saturday before any regular, special, or official primary

election and the day of such election.

The last day for General Registration does not apply to persons who vote under the Absent Voters' Law. (See Registration by Affidavit).

Notice is hereby given that I will be at my residence 20850 Pearl Street, on

SATURDAY, OCT. 29th, 1932—LAST DAY

For General Registration by Personal Application for Said Election.

The name of no person but an ACTUAL Resident of the precinct at the time of said registration and entitled under the Constitution, if remaining such resident, to vote at the next election, shall be entered in the registration book.

REGISTRATION BY AFFIDAVIT
Sec. 10—Registering of Electors: Any absent voter, as defined in this act, whose name is not registered and who shall claim the right to vote by absent voter's ballot at any election or primary election, may at the time of making application for absent voter's ballot, present to the township clerk an affidavit for registration.

Upon receipt of such affidavit in the time specified herein, the clerk shall write in the registration book the name of the applicant together with the other information required by this chapter and such applicant shall thereupon be deemed to be duly and properly registered.

Note—If this acknowledgment is taken outside of the State, the certificate of the court that the person taking the acknowledgment is a notary must be attached.

Provision in Case of Removal to Another Precinct.
Any registered and qualified voter who has REMOVED from ONE ELECTION PRECINCT of a TOWNSHIP to another election precinct of the same TOWNSHIP shall have the right, on any day previous to election, or primary Township Clerk, to have his or her name transferred from the registration book of the precinct from which he or she HAS RESIDED of the precinct in which he or she THEN RESIDES. Such elector shall have the right to have such transfer made on any ELECTION or Primary election day by obtaining from the board of inspectors of such election or primary election of the precinct from which he or she HAS REMOVED a CERTIFICATE OF TRANSFER and presenting the said certificate to the BOARD OF ELECTION INSPECTORS OF THE PRECINCT IN WHICH HE OR SHE THEN RESIDES.

In every case of transfer the Township Clerk or the Board of Inspectors issuing such certificate shall cause opposite the name of such elector, to be entered in the column headed "Remarks" in the registration book, the words, "transferred to precinct number" (giving the number), together with the initials of said clerk or inspectors of Election, as the case may be, and the date of the transfer.

Daley, Receiver of the Peoples State Bank of Farmington, defendant in the above cause, having been brought on to be heard before this court, praying for the Order of this Court giving all persons who may have claims against said Peoples State Bank of Farmington, an opportunity to present their respective claims to said Receiver and make legal proof thereof:

On motion of A. Floyd Blakeslee, Attorney for Receiver, IT IS ORDERED that all persons who may have claims against said Peoples State Bank of Farmington, present the same to John N. Daley, Receiver, within ninety days from this date, and the said Receiver is hereby authorized to prepare suitable blanks for proofs of claim and to mail a copy of this notice with said form for proof of claim to each of the creditors of said Bank.
