# Rocks Edge Turf Tips, Quips Bulldogs

Bentley fell to Plymouth 21-12 to conclude a dismal high school football season with a dismal performance.

The Bulldogs ended with a 2-5 record while Plymouth is on the upswing with a 4-4 accounting, and a contest on tap this Friday against Western Six champion Farmington Harrison.

This is the second year in a row that the Rocks have defeated the Bulldogs. Plymouth shut out Bentley 25-0 last year.

Bentley tallied first with quarterback Brian Gates going over from the two after Mark Roy had recovered a Plymouth fumble on the 33.

Plymouth bounced back in the second, marching 65 yards in 12 plays with Mike Tiano romping two yards for the score. Jim Szilagyi converted and the Rocks were up 7-6.

The Rocks scored again in the second quarter when Szilagyi passed to Steve Crowther for a 15 yard TD play. Szilagyi split the uprisings and Plymouth was up 14-6.

BENTLEY started driving early in the third quarter, and it appeared that Norm Stalzer

was in for a score. But he fumbled as he crossed the goal line and Steve Robb recovered for Plymouth, halting a Bulldog sure-score.

The Bulldogs tallied early in the fourth quarter sparked by a 32-yard punt return by Bob Wasilewski to the Plymouth 25.

Six plays later, Gates went over from the four, but the extra point attempt failed, and Plymouth still led 14-12.

PLYMOUTH rebounded with an insurance score, marching 70 yards in four plays highlighted by a 58 yard off-tackle slant by Mark Allen. Szilagyi converted, and the Rocks were on top 21-12.

## Schoolcraft Girls Win

The girl's volleyball squad at Schoolcraft Community College scored its second victory of the year in a match against Grand Rapids Junior College.

Grand Rapids scored a victory in the first game 15-2, but Schoolcraft came back to win 15-7 and 15-8.

The girls travel to Concordia Lutheran Thursday afternoon.

The battle between Windsor Raceway and Jackson - at Northville for the American dollars that go through the mutual machines at night harness racing is on. As of this moment, after a week of lead-on confrontation, it appears that Jackson has a slight edge . . . gained principally on the weekends.

Windsor has a big advantage in the Sunday matinees but Jackson more than makes up for that during the week.

Although the Jackson handle was above figures for the same nights a year ago, it wasn't until Friday that it actually bettered the Windsor action. The tracks were above equal on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

Then came Jackson's big break - through Friday when a crowd of 4,467 wagered \$356,552. On the same night, Windsor handled \$298,823 with 4,774 in the stands.

The difference in attendance may well be attributed to the \$1 general admission in Windsor and the \$1.50 at Northville.

The story was just about the same Saturday with Jackson reporting 5,069 and wagering of \$367,721 and Windsor showing figures of 5,302 and \$330,972.

ALL OF WHICH makes for happy days for Jackson President and General Manager Leon Slavin who had been counting the nights all week until his operation passed that in Canada.

But there is a day of reckoning coming for both tracks. Neither is handling enough to keep the current purse schedule and it appears that each will order cutbacks within another two weeks.

There doesn't appear to be any way either track can keep a \$900 minimum and offer purses as high as \$4,000 and \$5,000 for top events on weekends unless the handle climbs during the current week.

As we see things right now, the only outfit that is making out on the Jackson operation is the state of Michigan which gets a share of the wagering regardless of whether it is \$100,000 or \$1 million.

For instance, Saturday Windsor put up \$5,000 for an invitational pace that drew only five entrants. More than that, the list included High Ideal who stood out of his four rivals like a big tent.

High Ideal went postward at 25 cents to a dollar, won handily and then cost the track additional monies in a minus pool to show.

Jackson had six entrants in

## Jays Top F'ton On 28-Yard Boot

Southfield's Pat Watts booted a 28-yard field goal with 29 seconds remaining to give the Blue Jays a 9-7 homecoming victory over Farmington and a 4-4 mark for the season.

Southfield wraps up season play with Birmingham Seaholm Friday under the lights. Farmington (3-5) hosts cross-town rival North Farmington who stand 7-1 for the year.

Farmington struck midway through the second quarter with the aid of a bad Blue Jay punt. The Falcons started the drive on Southfield's 41 and marched the distance in 12 plays capped by a three-yard score by Dan Feiten.

Brian Chesley split the uprisings and Farmington led 7-0.

SOUTHFIELD rebounded late in the quarter when Ray Klockho recovered a Falcon fumble on the Farmington 40. A roughing penalty advanced it closer to pay-dirt and Bill Sage climaxed the drive on a 13-yard touchdown romp.

Dennis Kash attempted to put Southfield ahead on a two-point play but was stopped short and Farmington held a 7-6 halftime advantage.

Southfield drove into Farmington territory twice in the third quarter but had turnovers halt each drive. A Kash pass was intercepted by Falcon Mike Eveleth to halt a 40-yard drive and after marching 60 yards a pitchout was fumbled with Falcon Rick Ryan recovering on his eight

to stop another Southfield threat.

IN THE closing minutes the Blue Jays starting moving from their 42 with Kash connecting with Dave Gilken who sprinted to the Falcon 17-yard line. Kash spurred the 11 but was halted there on two incomplete passes.

With 29 seconds on the clock, Watts kicked the game winning field goal giving Southfield a two-point margin. It was his second of the year with the first being against Kimball on a 25 yarder.

Southfield outtrashed Farmington 157-131 and picked up 12 first downs to 11 by the Falcons. Kash was 7-15 for 36 yards passing while Tony Wenson of Farmington went 2-10 for only 23 yards.

## East Ties For First In 41-6 Inkster Tilt

Garden City East and Wayne each won its last Mid-Wayne league game to tie for the title with 5-1 won-lost records.

East toppled Inkster 41-6 while Wayne shut out Annapolis 26-0. East won the title

outright last year and tied with Taylor for the crown in 1969.

ALEX PATTERSON led the Panther attack with three touchdowns romps in five carries of 67 yards total.

My son informed me that by New Year's day we'll have more snow than we've had since 1965. He has his own sources of information of course. It reminds me of some of the snow reports I've read about in the past.

I can recall phoning a certain foreign airline about a week before heading for Europe. They informed me that the particular resort I was inquiring about had a 76-inch base and three inches of new powder snow.

Needless to say, I was overjoyed. Unfortunately when I arrived at the area, which was in the middle of February, I found that it hadn't snowed since Christmas and what little snow they had was down to earth and grass. Which just goes to prove you can't believe everything you read or hear.

If you are really serious about going somewhere but want to be assured good snow conditions, the best bet is to pick up the phone and call the area, or better yet a motel near the area. Of course you are still taking a chance that the party on the other end is honest and sincere. Most of the areas in Michigan have snow-making equipment which requires a temperature of 28 degrees to make artificial snow.

So in many instances your chances of finding good snow conditions are better in Michigan than they might be in the East, West, or even Europe!

Patterson completed the scoring attack with a five - yard burst early in the fourth quarter with Jost converting to push the lead up to 41-6.

EAST TOTALED 178 yards passing on eight of 15 passes and rushed for 178, to Inkster's 100 yards in total offense.

East hosts cross-town rival Garden City, West Friday night in the season wrap - up for each team.

"We have identical records of 6-2 but they outsize us," said East Coach Gary Humphrey. "I hope is a dry night so that we can utilize our speed."
