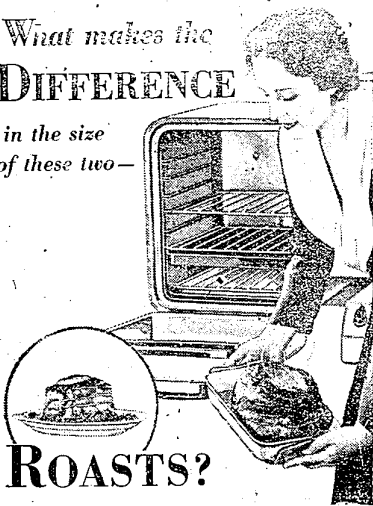

Change Grand River Signs After Protests

(Continued from page one)

On Monday afternoon Mr. Oakes, with Edward J. Vaughn, county maintenance engineer, and two other state highway engineers, came to Farmington and were told of resentment among Farmington business-men. They agreed at once to remove the word "only" from the "Farmington traffic signs." During a two-hour conference the entire matter was discussed.

"Laning Traffic"

The engineers pointed out that the purpose of the overhead signs is for "laning" traffic and better controlling it. The "only" sign, which have been installed at both ends of the cut-off are traffic-actuated lights. "Pads" are imbedded in the road and as a car approaches a light, the electric switching over the pad operates the switch which turns the light to green. The aim of the overhead sign is to get the cars into the right lanes so they will strike the pads and operate the signals properly, keeping traffic moving.

The engineers stated Monday that the lettering of the signs had been specified at Lansing, and apparently the fact that Grand River is still a through road had not been given sufficient consideration.

Removed The "Only"

On Wednesday the word "only" was painted out of the signs as promised. Mr. Oakes' solution of the sign problem, presented Thursday morning, appeared to have met all objections. Business-men on Grand River were ready to concede that the cut-off having been built, they could hardly object to the highway department's notifying motorists that it is there, providing it is also indicated that there is a choice of routes and that Grand River goes through. A number of the business-men expressed approval of Mr. Oakes' consideration and the spirit of co-operation he showed in the matter when the objections had been brought to his attention. Monday night 25 business-men met with the City Commission to protest about the signs. Mayor Lamb stated that he would see State Highway Commissioner Grover C. Dillman about it Thursday but Mr. Oakes' plan presented Thursday morning precluded the necessity of taking the matter up with Mr. Dillman.

Legion Is Active

Meanwhile members of Groves-Walker Post, American Legion instituted the idea of Farmington's erecting a large billboard ahead of each junction, to attract motorists to using Grand River through Farmington. The Exchange Club Wednesday noon designated a committee to cooperate with the Legionnaires. President N. H. Power naming Earl Vivier, Lloyd Gullen, and Howard Warner.

The visit of Mr. Oakes to Farmington Thursday was the third within a week. On Friday of last week, C. E. Foster, chief engineer of the highway department and chief assistant to Commissioner Dillman, came to Farmington with Mr. Oakes and C. F. Boehler, engineer of design. The coming was a result of criticism of the curve at the west end of the Cut-off. They stated that they do not consider the conditions at that point to be ideal, but they pointed out the vast difficulties of bringing together three roads on a sharp grade. They stated that if experience shows improvements might be made, they would make them as rapidly as possible.

Widening In Spring

Mr. Foster indicated that some changes might be made next spring where the Cut-off and west Grand River meet. He said that Mr. Dillman plans to widen Grand River from Farmington Road west to the Cut-off, as he has promised Farmington, and at that time some additional concrete might be laid on the curve where the roads meet.

PLAN DEMOLAY CONCLAVE

December 10 means a full day for DeMolays. The annual conclave is to be held on that date in the new Masonic Temple in Detroit. A trip through the Temple is scheduled for 11:30. At one-thirty the Conclave prayer starts with the ceremony of welcoming visitors, and a steak banquet is promised at six o'clock. This will be followed by finals in the District Speakers Contest, after which the DeMolay degree will be conferred in the Scottish Rite Cathedral.
