The Sign of the Cross In Detroit On Christmas

The man who shot lightning from the skies in "The King of Kings" and parted the waters of the Red sea in "The Ten Commandments" now touches flaming brands to the pagan city of Rome in "The Sign of the Cross." This is Cecil B. DeMille's first contribution to the talking picture screen, and by it, it is said, he has demonstrated that the talking picture is as adaptable to mass spectacle as was the silent screen.

"The Sign of the Cross" commences in Detroit a tour of the legitimate theaters of the country prior to being shown in regular motion picture theaters, at the Wilson Theater on Christmas Day, at 2:30 o'clock. There will be two performances daily during this engagement, and all seats will be reserved.

For the leading players in the production DeMille has selected Freddie March to play the young Roman noble, Elissa Landi as the Christian girl, Charles Laughton as Nero, and Claudette Colbert as Nero's exotic wife. The production cost upwards of a million dollars, and in addition to the extensive cast supporting the four stars, there are some 7,500 extra players used in the lavish scenes.

While Mr. DeMille believes "The Sign of the Cross" demonstrates that spectacle has as distinct a place on the talking screen as it had on the silent, he contends that it is absolutely necessary for the talking picture spectacle to contain a powerful and gripping story, which many of the spectacles in the silent days did not have.

TRANS-CANADIAN TELEPHONE ROUTE IS NEARLY READY

Seven Telephone Systems Unite to Build New Coast-to-Coast Line Across Eight Provinces

Another transcontinental telephone line, providing direct voice connection between the Atlantic and Pacific seaboard, while linking the intermediate points, is now under construction along an all-Canadian route between Halifax, Nova Scotia, and Vancouver, British Columbia, and is scheduled for completion by the end of 1933.

Route is 4,263 Miles Long Canada's seven major telephone systems are cooperating in the construction of this new route, through eight Canadian provinces. The total length of the line is 4,263 miles, of which 242 are in Nova Scotia, 315 in New Brunswick, 1,562 in Ontario and Quebec, 242 in Manitoba, 465 in Saskatchewan, 418 in Alberta, and 659 in British Columbia.

Many of the individual links within the several provinces have been constructed and in operation for longer or shorter periods, and telephone service between the eastern and western provinces has been available by routing calls in part through the United States. But of the 4,263 mile distance between Vancouver and Halifax, 1,447 pole-line miles were built in 1929, and 1,427 remained to be constructed in 1931.

Starting at Halifax, the line proceeds in a northerly and then in a westerly direction to the Bay of Fundy and thence to Riviere du Loup on the St. Lawrence river. It then follows the course of the St. Lawrence to Quebec and Montreal over the lines of the Bell Telephone Company of Canada. The Bell lines continue to Toronto and then in a northerly direction to North Bay and from that point due west through Sudbury and White River to Port William. From the latter place, the route continues to Winnipeg in Manitoba, Regina in Saskatchewan, Medicine Hat and Calgary in Alberta, and finally to its western terminus at Vancouver in British Columbia.

Greater Part Has Been Completed Most of the circuits in the trans-Canada system are of open-wire construction; with the wires spaced eight inches apart on the cross-arms to permit the carrier system operation which will provide the longer through circuits. The completed system requires 22 repeater stations, situated, with the necessary equipment, to reduce the diminishing voice currents as they travel long distances, thus permitting good reception at the end of the line.

By August of this year, construction of the inter-provincial links had progressed so far that the line was open for service between Nova Scotia and Alberta, and now, with the addition of British Columbia routes, to complete the coast-to-coast route by the beginning of 1933.
