CLARENCE ALDRICH SENDS WORD FROM WHERE IT'S WARM

Farmington Man, In Florida For His Health, Remembers Friends In North

The joys of warm weather, are recalled by Clarence Aldrich in a letter addressed to Edgar S. Pierce, but intended for all his friends in Farmington.

Mr. Aldrich is spending the winter months in Miami, Florida, for his health. Mr. Shell is also there. The letter follows:

Dear Edgar and all:-

I left home on November 16 and came down here via Cincinnati, Lexington, Cumberland Gap, Asheville, Greenville, Greenwood, Augusta, Way Cross and Jacksonville. A beautiful scenic highway. Stopped many places along the route but am glad I came here. 'Tis heaven on earth.

You probably know Miami Beach is sort of an island, separated from the mainland and Miami by Biscayne Bay, the causeway (bridge) separating the two towns is 3.1 miles long. We (Mr. Shell is with me), are just two blocks from the ocean, and OH is it lovely. I just can't stay away, but not on account of the people there, I haven't associated with anyone, or won't I love to be in the water and also sit in the sand. I am glad I am a good swimmer, and I go out quite a ways. Many man-eating sharks are being caught, but none near shore, except small ones. The ocean was the calmest today it has been since we have been here (18 days), some days you have to watch out the waves will knock you down.

I may be criticized for being here, but our good Doctor knew my condition and I want to thank him for advising me to go where it is warm, or die, and I am living here for much less than I would

have lived at home. We have a nice room, 2 beds, \$5.00 per week. (rates will go up after January 1st). Meals (2 a day) 25 cents to 50 cents. Could live even cheaper in Miami. Of course there are other expenses. We do not go to dances, or shows but was to dog races Saturday night. 10 races, 8 dogs to the race, 30 cents admission. Money is made from the betting. Minimum bet is \$2.00. We didn't bet.

Sunday's a. m. to Catholic Church. P. M. to Community Church.

Never saw so many hotels and apartment houses in my life, also beautiful homes, wide streets, and no fires, no smoke, so clean. Palms and shrubs do not shed their foliage here, so beautiful always.

Have been pretty well over Miami. Nice town. Also Coral Gables to the Biltmore Hotel, swellest in the country. Run by Doherty, the oil man.

\$10,000.00 golf game 2 weeks ago. Rates extremely high here. Am informed one party is paying \$250 per day.
