 has prevailed for the past three years. It is a development that is expected to meet with much approval.
 Sheriff-elect Reynolds emphasized that his decision not to reappoint Deputy Tamm was forced by the drastic cuts made in the appropriations for his department. He stated that he has high regard for Deputy Tamm as an officer, but that with his force to be little more than half what it is now, he had to regretfully take the step of dropping many capable men. Deputy Tamm has been an officer for five years.
 Deputy DeVriendt will be on duty nights because most law violations occur then but will actually have 24-hour duty because of his being subject to call.

Saving Made
 The naming of Wilson to a regular post will be an economical aid in operating on the trimmed budget. It will have the effect of saving nearly the amount of a deputy's salary. It is also welcomed by Deputy Wilson himself, it is understood. Although his physique was severely shocked when he was shot down by Florian Maschinski about six years ago, friends say he has felt for some time that he is well able to handle a deputy's work and is eager to get back on active duty.

Feeling between Sheriff-elect Reynolds and both City and Township officials is of the friendliest, and it is anticipated that the new regime will be marked by close co-operation between local and county officials.
 Sheriff-elect Reynolds also is appealing for the interested co-operation of the general public. Because of the smaller staff, he states, it will be necessary for the people to take an interest in and aid the work of the sheriff's men in detecting and apprehending law-breakers.

 hall Friday to pay tribute to Dr. Adams.
 Mayor Murphy referred to the retiring chairman of his unemployment committee as the man "appointed to his task of aiding the City of Detroit in the greatest calamity that has befallen it since its foundation in 1701, not through any individual's advice, but by heavenly direction;" and to Dr. Adams' work as "an expression of Christianity translated into action."

Other comments on Dr. Adams by those present at the Detroit farewell were, "Detroit's most useful citizen;" "One of the few real Christians in our community" and "A clergyman who practised what he preached."
 As chairman of the unemployment committee he supervised the registration of 128,000 unemployed, the finding of jobs for more than 50,000 men and women, the sold clothes drives of 1930 and 1931, when more than \$1,000,000 worth of discarded clothing was gathered and distributed to the needy; the feeding of school children, and housing homeless men and women.
 Dr. Adams will preach his last sermon in Detroit Christmas Day.

Aid for War Veterans

More than 430,000 ex-service men and their families were aided through 3,003 Red Cross Chapters and the national organizations during the year ending June 30, 1931. Dependent families were cared for, veterans' claims were filed, hospitalization obtained and many other services given. Part of each contribution during the American Red Cross annual roll call, Armistice Day to Thanksgiving Day, goes toward supporting this vital work for veterans of the World War and other wars in which the United States has engaged.

Books for the Blind

Through American Red Cross Chapters, 3,827 volumes of novels, class books and others, transcribed into braille for blind readers, have been added to libraries, in the past year. These books are to be obtained through the Library of Congress and city libraries. This activity, carried on by a great number of devoted women volunteers in Red Cross Chapters, had its inception in preparing books for war blinded.

1932 LICENSES TO BE GOOD THROUGH FEBRUARY 1, 1933

Time Is 30 Days Shorter Than In Previous Years; Need Funds For Road Work
 The time limit for the legal use of 1932 motor vehicle license plates has been extended to February 1, 1933, according to announcement by Secretary of State Frank D. Fitzgerald.
 A further extension to March 1, may be made in the future unless there is a decided change in economic conditions, it was announced. Power to extend the time for using license plates is granted the secretary of state under the 1931 law.

In 1931 and 1932 the use of the previous year's plates was extended the entire 60 days under the law. This year the decision to extend the legal period for 1932 plates only 30 days, was influenced by the fact that the state highway department, which receives motor vehicle weight tax fees, needs the funds for construction projects that will provide employment.

"The highway department has an acute need for all funds due it," Mr. Fitzgerald said. Any delay in receiving funds will seriously hamper that department. On the other hand, automobile owners have their January tax bills to meet a week after Christmas.

"In order to spread the taxes over a longer period, the time limit for securing new license plates has been extended to February 1. If the next few weeks show that thousands of automobile owners will be unable to purchase 1933 licenses by that date, and will be compelled to stop using their autos on that account, a further extension may be made.

"In the meantime, all automobile owners who are financially able to do so, will be aiding the state and their less fortunate neighbors, if they secure their 1933 plates as soon as possible."
