3,000,000 FAMILIES HELPED BY RED CROSS

Distress in All Areas Met by Giving Food, Clothing and Other Aid.

More than 3,000,000 families throughout the nation were given relief of various types by the American Red Cross in the past winter, to aid them in their distress caused by unemployment, disaster or other misfortune.

A major relief task, due to unemployment and other unusual conditions in the blizzard-stricken counties in twenty states, was met by the Red Cross chapters alone or participating with other agencies. In those 143 counties, the Red Cross aided 90,000 families through giving groceries, school lunches, clothing, food and other necessities.

Flour, milled from government wheat turned over to the Red Cross by Congress, was given to 15,000,000 persons in the period from March 3 to June 30, the close of the fiscal year. Flour will continue to be given through the winter of 1932-33, and Red Cross chapters also will give cotton clothing, made from government cotton turned over to the Red Cross for distribution.

"The Red Cross faces the busiest winter since the days of the World War," Chairman John Barton Payne said in a statement. "The Red Cross is organized in nearly every one of the 3,472 counties in the United States, and will co-operate with all agencies to meet distress wherever found. The four has proved of great benefit, and the cotton clothing will be given wide distribution."

While carrying on nation-wide these unemployment and other relief measures, the Red Cross also was engaged in its regular activities in public health, nursing, service to ex-service men and their families, teaching home hygiene, life saving and first aid. The Junior Red Cross, composed of almost 100,000 school children, also rallied to the support of the society's relief efforts, and the children aided others of their age in practical ways, formed sewing and food canning classes, and were of great assistance in chapter relief work.

While the wheat and cotton were given by the U. S. Government, no money was provided to pay for the necessary work of the Red Cross. The Red Cross will meet this expense of almost \$500,000 from its treasury. Citizens can aid by joining as members of the local Red Cross chapter during the year.

FARMINGTON MEN ATTEND BANQUET FOR LEGISLATORS

Pontiac Cut-Off Situation, Similar To Farmington's Mentioned In Report

A dozen residents of Farmington Township and City attended a banquet given Wednesday night by Pontiac Real Estate Board in honor of four legislators of this district, George A. Dondero, Andrew L. Moore, Fred Watkins and Melvin H. Lee, all newly elected except Mr. Lee.

Taxation was the subject of discussion, and the Pontiac real estate organization's plan for remedying the present large tax delinquency was outlined in detail. Due to illness, three of the four guests of honor were absent, only Mr. Watkins being able to attend and speak.

An item of particular interest to Farmington men was read in the report of the past year's work by the Pontiac Real Estate Board. In that report the president, Paul A. Kern, mentioned among the Board's activities the erection of signs at the limits of Pontiac attempting to bring motorists into the city instead of detouring around it; also the efforts being made to induce road officials to remove the "detour" signs at Telegraph Road intersections at either end of the city, these signs tending to route drivers around instead of through Pontiac.

The situation in Pontiac regarding Woodward Avenue and Telegraph road resembles Farmington's condition regarding Grand River and the Cut-off.
