ker reports March 3. Supervisor Coe, Highway Commissioner Goers, Clerk Campbell, and Justice Blanchard returned to office in Township election March 7. Mrs. Loretta Cox is named treasurer. John Thomas overseed, Don Button, board of review member, and William Gregor, Fred Menke, William LaForge, and Henry Dehanke are named as constables.

Recount asked in Southfield Township primary, as Highway Commissioner James Kirchoff receives 230 votes to 223 for Daniel E. Hughes, his opponent in Republican primary. Mr. Kirchoff wins by one vote in recount March 14.

Three of the four ministers who have held Farmington Methodist pastorate in last 10 years participate in decennial of present church building, March 17. Rosetta Cairns and Viola Krumm, Farmington girls are injured seriously in auto accident March 4, but recover.

Five per cent dividend to Farmington State Savings Bank depositors is announced. Kindergarten, French, Music, and health departments dropped from 1932-33 Farmington schools program.
