Other lecturers will be Mrs. Helen Leisher of Bellevue, Ohio, speaking on March 10 on "The Egg, Holder of Life, Symbol for Man, Artists' Canvas," and Dr. Sidney M. Goldstein of the University of Wisconsin fine arts faculty discussing "Glass and Ancient Religions" April 14.

The series will end with "Wonders With Weeds," discussed May 12 by Mrs. Jo Goldmolder, practitioner in the art of natural coloring with plant life.

2 Congregations Form Beth Abraham-Hillel

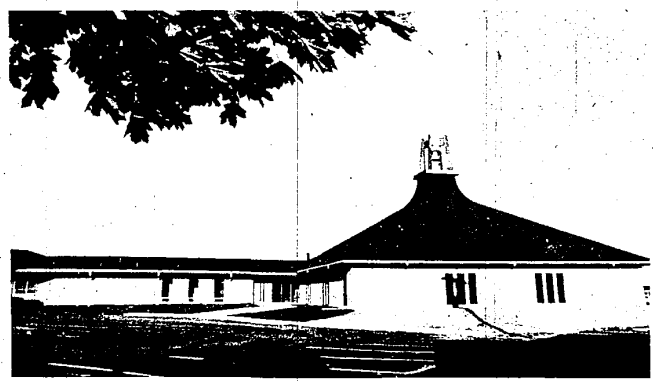

Bible Paraphraser To Receive Award

The annual award of the Laymen's National Bible Committee will be presented this year to Dr. Kenneth N. Taylor of Wheaton, Ill. for his efforts in paraphrasing the entire Bible. The honors will be bestowed during a luncheon Nov. 19 in New York City.

The meeting serves to launch National Bible Week, Nov. 21-28, sponsored annually by the committee.

Former Supreme Court Justice Arthur J. Goldberg, national chairman of the organization, said a certificate will also be given to Pearl S. Buck for her recent book, "The Story Bible."

It took 16 years of research and writing for Dr. Taylor to complete "The Living Bible," which was published Sept. 1 of this year. Already "The Living Bible" is in fourth printing with 1 million copies in circulation. In several major cities it is now on the top 10 best-seller list, ranking as high as third place on some.

"The Living Bible" is called a "paraphrase" by Dr. Taylor. He explains that a "paraphrase is a thought-for-thought translation while a literal translation is done word-for-word." He feels literal translations are excellent but difficult to understand and do not easily communicate the word of God.

The theme of National Bible Week this year is "One World, One Book."

Co-publisher of "The Living Bible" is Doubleday & Company along with Dr. Taylor's firm, Tyndale House Publishers of Wheaton, Ill.

Presbyterian Lay Leader Speaks At Ward
