### IS CRITICALLY ILL

**FISH LIKE 'BROWN' JUG**  
Lansing.—Fish have a penchant for the "little brown jug," Guy Lincoln, in charge of the State Fish Hatchery at Oden has discovered.

In an attempt to find a labor saving device for feeding fingerling fish in the hatchery races and ponds, Lincoln took a gallon jug, filled it with food and turned it up side down in the water with the neck just below the surface. As the food trickled slowly out the fish began to gather. After a few days of use, Lincoln said that the fish would crowd around the neck of the jug as soon as it was placed in the water.

Lincoln's experiment proved so successful that it is now in use at a trout feeding station and it is probable that the system will be extensively used.

#### ASKED TO FILL CARDS

Lansing.—With the approach of the 1933 fishing seasons, the Department of Conservation is again urging fishermen to assist in determining fishing conditions; by filling out creel census cards. The cards, distributed by conservation officers, are used by the Division in determining the trend of fishing conditions.

#### GETS 40 DAYS

Lansing.—The first case reported in 1933 of netting trout in Michigan resulted in a 40 day jail sentence. Joe Cooper, Honor, was convicted of having a gill net from which trout were being taken in the Platte River, he was not given an opportunity of paying a fine.

#### DESTRUCTIVE FIRES

Lansing.—Forest fires running through jack pine stands during the spring are thirty percent more destructive than during the fall, and a jack pine a foot high has three times the chance of being killed by fire than has an adult tree.

### COLLECT CREEL CARDS

Lansing, Mich.—Michigan anglers who received creel census cards in 1932 are being urged by the Department of Conservation to turn them over to the local conservation officer or to send them to the Lansing office. Thousands of cards were distributed to fisherman last year and a large number of them have been returned. These cards indicate the number and kinds of fish taken from specific waters and other information concerning fishing conditions.

**Highway Interests Reduce Tax**  
Lansing, Mich.—Highway interests have made the greatest contribution to date of any governmental agency or function in reducing the tax of the property owner.

This was asserted by State Highway Commissioner Grover C. Dillman in a letter to E. W. McFarland, president of the Detroit Teachers' Association, pointing out the fallacy of statements made in the association's bulletin to the effect that \$20,000,000 could be diverted from highway funds and still leave \$25,000,000 for highway maintenance.

Mr. Dillman's letter points out that already approximately \$18,000,000 of the entire weight tax receipts are being returned to county and local governmental units for tax reduction purposes together with \$2,500,000 more to be used for maintenance of township roads being taken over by county highway organizations.
