The one contest which provided a bit of a thrill for the voters was for the office of clerk, and strangely for a primary, the campaign developed was not between candidates of the same party...

The feature was a last-minute attack on Clerk Willard Campbell, seeking the Republican nomination, by a pamphlet urging the nomination of Mrs. Ina Sturman on the Democrat ticket.

Each candidate had two opponents on their respective tickets, and each eventually won out to oppose each other at the election April 3. Mr. Campbell last week distributed a circular attacking the record of the Sturman pamphlet was distributed to houses in the Township late Sunday afternoon.

The voting for the Republican nomination for clerk was as follows: Precinct 1, 205; Precinct 2, 132. Total 337.

Dr. H. E. Boice won the Democrat nomination for Supervisor by 23 votes from his nearest rival, George R. Williams, in a contest in which the votes were widely split geographically.

The Democrat vote for supervisor was: Precinct 1, 104; Precinct 2, 43. Total 147.

Mrs. Cox Wins Mrs. Loretta Cox, township treasurer, defeated in gaining nomination for another year on the Republican ticket.

The Democrat contest for treasurer was much closer, with Theodore Kohlman 11 votes ahead of the second candidate, as follows: Kohlman 56; 41; 97.

Graham Is Victor Joseph Graham, former highway commissioner, won decisively in the battle for the Democrat nomination for that office, defeating two opponents. The vote: Graham 120; 58; 178.

Highway Commissioner Clayton Goers had no opposition for the Republican nomination, and on April 3 he and Mr. Graham will fight it out for the office. They have been opponents several times before, but always previously on the same party ticket.

Wilson Wins In one of the contests that attracted most interest, Charles L. Wilson won the Republican nomination for justice of the peace, defeating two opponents. Mr. Wilson carried his home precinct, No. 1, by a wide margin, sufficient so that by running a close second in Precinct 2, his lead in Precinct No. 1 won for him a 2-1 majority. The vote: Wilson 125; 89; 214.

Frank Steele won the Democrat nomination for justice of the peace by more than two to one, as follows: Steele 112; 61; 173.

A Close Fight

John L. Thomas, road overseer, won the Republican nomination in a close fight with Nelson Vandenberg. Thomas carried Precinct 1 where Vandenberg ran fourth. But in his own Precinct, No. 2, Vandenberg ran first with Thomas a close second and the other two far in the rear. The result was that Thomas nosed out Vandenberg by 14 votes: Thomas 110; 167; Vandenberg 28; 125; 153; Bostwick 42; 23; 65; Merritt 44; 14; 58.

William Vallance, Democrat nominee who had no contest, will oppose Thomas for overseer on April 3.

Harry Winters, William Gregor, Henry Dehanke and William LaForge are constable nominees on the Republican ticket and have no Democrat opponents. They polled 334, 320, 305 and 293 votes respectively. Charles Heise received 385 votes for board of review and has no Democrat opponent.
