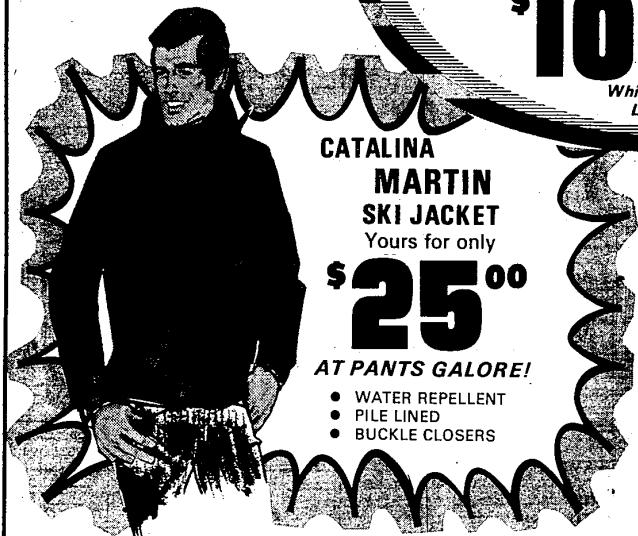

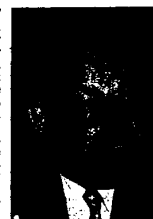

## Magazine To Profile Our Eddie

"Happy Birthday, Eddie."

Not only will that pleasant phrase be directed many times Friday to Observer Newspapers' W. W. Edgar, but on Sunday the Detroit Free Press also will join in the accolade to the man who is believed to be the area's oldest working newsman.

An article in the Free Press magazine section will give the highlights of Edgar's 55 years in newspaper work, including his encounters with William Jennings Bryan, Boise Penrose, Edgar A. Guest, Ralph Greenleaf, Ty Cobb, Babe Ruth, Joe Louis and other greats in sports and politics.

IT ACTUALLY was Guest who inspired Eddie to leave his beloved Pennsylvania Dutch country as a youth to try his hand as a cub sports writer with the Free Press in the early '20s. His stay there lasted 42 years, including service for a while as sports editor, and when he retired it only was to begin a new career as executive secretary of the Michigan Bowling Proprietors' Association.

Hailed as the man who did the most to boom the bowling industry in the metropolitan Detroit area in the '50s, Edgar had his second "retirement" in 1965—and quickly was back in the saddle again as the Observer's Plymouth editor. The winner of many journalistic and service awards, Edgar was given the title of "roving editor" of Observer Newspapers in 1968. Since then he has been tireless in

digging up some of the most fascinating news stories for the readers of all Observerland.

EDGAR'S OBSERVER column, "The Stroller," twice has been judged the state's best in Michigan Press Association competition, and some of the yarns he has spun in those writings will be recalled in the Free Press feature.

Included will be the tale of how Eddie happened to be sitting in the boat with Gar Wood when the latter broke the world's water speed record, and of how Eddie talked himself out of winning the Pulitzer Prize in journalism in 1931.

Happy birthday, Eddie — and your thousands of friends hope there will be many more.

## Cities' Road Funds Boosted

Observerland's cities and villages will receive increased funds from the third quarter Motor Vehicle Highway Fund collection.

State Highway Director Henrik Stafseth said net receipts of the fund during July, August and September, increased by 4.8 per cent over the same period in 1970 to a total of \$81,461,400.

Wayne County will receive \$4,759,100 and Oakland County will receive \$2,059,000.

OBSERVERLAND cities and villages will receive the following:

Beverly Hills, \$34,152 (\$25,302 in 1970); Bingham Farms \$1,939 (\$1,634); Farmington, \$23,106 (\$17,585); Franklin Village \$9,842 (\$7,969); Garden City, \$96,988 (\$89,257); Lathrup Village \$13,705 (\$11,747); Livonia \$270,884 (\$192,115); Plymouth \$26,834 (\$21,100); Quakertown, \$2,589 (\$1,870); Southfield \$209,206 (\$132,853); Westland \$190,722 (\$167,233); and Wood Creek Farms, \$3,583 (\$2,701).

Cities get 20 per cent of the funds, while counties get 34 per cent and 46 per cent goes to the Department of State Highways.

## Drop Juror Age To 18, Says Esch

U.S. Rep. Marvin L. Esch (R-Ann Arbor) testified before a House subcommittee on his bill that would change the minimum age qualification for serving as a juror from 21 to 18 years of age.

Esch asserted that his bill would complete a process begun by Congress when they gave 18-year olds first the right to vote in federal elections, and then, with the passing of the 26th Amendment, the right to vote in elections at every level.

"With this legislation, Congress has the opportunity to act once more to guarantee to young people the full measure of their rights as citizens and voters by granting to them the right to serve on Federal juries."

SINCE 1965, Esch has supported lowering the voting age to 18, and asserted that the very same arguments which he has used in favor of that action are ones which are persuasive in favor of this bill.

"The age of 21 years can no longer be looked upon as the

magic threshold of civic responsibility. Nearly 80 per cent of the more than 11 million 18-21 year olds are high school graduates and more than half are engaged in higher education. Almost half of them are married. Three million of them have full-time jobs. Nearly 1 million are serving in the Armed Forces."

Esch added that an equally important argument was that young people will be encouraged to respect the judicial process if they are allowed full participation in that process.

ESCH ALSO pointed to a very pragmatic reason for the adoption of the legislation.

"The entire federal jury selection process is based upon the use of voter registration lists. Yet, with the lowering of the voting age to 18, such lists can no longer be the basis for the selection process unless the minimum age for jury service is once again made to correspond with the minimum age for voting."
