Hay Curing, Grading Demonstration Held

A hay curing and hay grading demonstration for farmers interested in the production of better alfalfa hay was held under the supervision of K. D. Bailey, county agricultural agent, at the L. C. Webber and Sons farm, Thursday, June 22.

At the meeting several lots of hay cured in different ways and the resulting quality were shown. There were also samples of the various market grades of alfalfa furnished by the Bureau of Economics of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The alfalfa crop in Michigan, according to Mr. Bailey, will average 800,000 acres this year. The yield is expected to be larger than that of any of the past three years.
