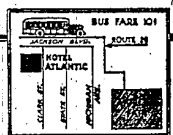

NAVY HUMOR

The operating plan for the Navy provides for maintaining one third of all combatant ships and aircraft in rotating reserve commission. This plan will be effective July 1, 1935, to January 1, 1936 the complete cycle for each one third of the fleet that rotates, will therefore, be eighteen months—12 months of operation and 6 months in rotating reserve commission. Navy yard overhauls will be accomplished when ships are in rotating reserve commission.

The affair was very much of a pitchers' battle with Zimmerman, a portlander, holding the bats of the Parkers in check, and Rowland the West Point moundsman, doing an effective job of silencing the sticks of the Monroe county outfit. A long tie between the two clubs was broken in the seventh inning when the Independents pushed two runs across the plate.

Giles and Hammond made some spectacular plays in the field for the Parkers. No errors were chalked up against either team. O'Mara of Detroit umpired the game.

HEAT, COLD, HAIL DROUGHT DESTROY CROPS IN SECTION

High Prices Prove Cruel Joke To Farmers; They Will Have Nothing To Sell

With farm prices soaring toward boom-time heights, farmers in the Farmington area are facing disappointment because of the injury done to crops by heat, cold and drought.

The intense heat of the past week, together with the high temperatures recorded during the early part of the month, have done serious damage to wheat, corn, oats and barley. Another contributing factor to the damage has been the lack of rainfall. The drought was not broken until the arrival of a heavy shower Wednesday afternoon. Although a heavy downpour was reported in Detroit on Tuesday, Farmington did not receive so much of a drop. The Wednesday shower brought slight relief from the heat which had sent a large number of the residents of the area to the lakes.

During the heat of the heat wave on Tuesday, temperatures of 100 degrees in the shade and 114 in the sun unofficially recorded in Farmington. The heat on Sunday increased the size of the opening day fishing crowds.

Wheat was not so much affected as other crops by the heat, according to County Agricultural Agent K. D. Biale. Corn did not seem to be injured and, in many cases, was reported ahead of the normal growth for the season. Much of it is already knee-high. Yet the hot winds and temperatures of a week ago, practically ruined the strawberry crop.

As indicated before, no peaches will appear this year because of the damage done during the excessive cold snap of February. For the same reason, the cherry output will be light. Fruit growers have no optimistic outlook in the apple field which promises to be of an exceptional quality this year. A larger and better shaped apple is expected.

The worst blow to the farmers, however, was the havoc wrought by the hailstorm of a week ago in the apple crop, which had promised to be an excellent one. The worst damage was done in the Thirteen-Mile road area where the crop was practically ruined.
