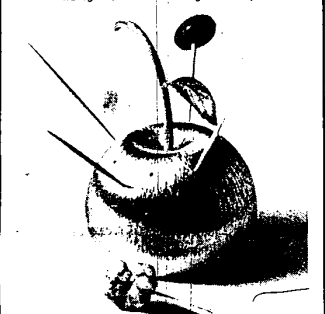
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Music Theory Approved By Schools

The Farmington Board of Education has approved in theory a program to allow music students and private instructors to use existing school facilities for instrumental and vocal lessons.

The program would not be of any expense to the district, but would allow students and specialized private instructors to meet in the schools, according to plans outlined at Monday's school board meeting by Larry Dettler, district music committee member and O.E. Dunkel Junior High School band director.

Board members voted 4-3 in calling for a specific operational plan from the music committee before voting full approval.

BOARD members Leland Clifford, Herbert Neal, Gary Lichtman and Richard Peters voted to have operational plans presented for approval before implementing any program.

Voting against requiring board approval for initial operation plans were Mrs. Patricia Smith, Dr. Sanford Bloomberg and John Washburn.

Under the proposed program outlined by Dettler, elementary and secondary students would be allowed to use school facilities after school hours during the business week to meet with instructors not available from the present music staff.

Discussion between Dettler, board members and local administrators lasted for more than an hour and three separate motions were presented before the board decided to require an operational outline before approving the program.

Herbert Neal proposed the first motion, which called for implementing the program and reviewing its progress on or before July 1, 1969. That motion passed by a 6 to 1 majority, with Clifford voting against the program.

Clifford said that the program would allow private individuals to use school facilities.

The Farmington City Council has named several residents to serve on the recently created Historical Preservation Committee. Those named to serve as first members of the committee include: Paul Schreiber of the Farmington Historical Society, Dennis J. Pandy of the Farmington Area Jaycees, Russell Milligan of the City Planning Commission, Dr. John Richardson of the Board of Commerce.

Mrs. Nole Kijth, of the Beautification Committee; Robert Van Every of the Kiwanis Club; Charles R. Carvell of the Lions Club and Harley Walters of the Farmington Exchange Club, were also appointed.

City officials have said that the committee will research and select historical buildings, homes, landmarks and areas in the city for preservation. The first meeting has been set for Dec. 3.

Russell Milligan has been named chairman by earlier council action.

Other members are expected to be named soon.

"Are we putting the school board in direct competition with local instructors who have to provide space during their instructions?" Clifford asked.

DETTLE said that the music department had no intention of creating a competitive situation.
"The instructors involved will be highly specialized and unusually qualified teachers not available from the staff," Dettler said.

Dettler said the intent of the program was to seek specialized instructors and bring them to a central location for private lessons.

Marius Van Ameyde, assistant superintendent for in-

struction, who has been working with the music committee since proposed last spring, said:

"The specialized instructors that will be involved in the program will probably cost the students more than private instructors more than available."

Board members Washburn and Bloomberg questioned whether the program would create competition for local instructors, but voted in favor of the program.

Several questions raised concerning the operational program included: specific locations for the classes, pay schedules and procedures for students and whether the board had authority to determine the cost to the students.

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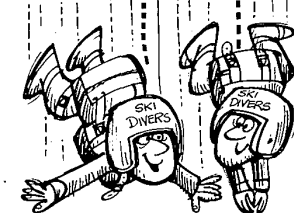
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
