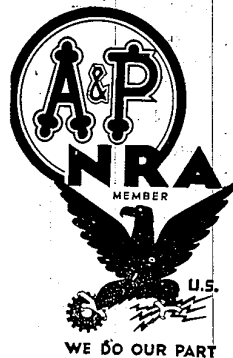

Telephone Exhibit at the Century of Progress Needs No Don Pedro

Famous Emperor Recognized Value of Bell's Invention, First Shown at Fair in 1876

Among those attending the Century of Progress Exposition in Chicago this summer may be some who also were present over half a century ago at the Centennial Exposition in Philadelphia in 1876.

Thought Telephone a Toy
It was at the Centennial in Philadelphia that Alexander Graham Bell first publicly exhibited his new invention, yet most people passed it by as a plaything, a toy. Indeed, it was not until Don Pedro, famous Emperor of Brazil, stopped to examine the new contrivance that Bell's "plaything" was given more than passing notice, even by the officials of the Exposition.

In the fifty-seven years that have elapsed since then, that generally unnoticed exhibit has developed into one of the most useful inventions of all time. And the invention which attracted the attention of few people in 1876 has developed into an achievement which, as exhibited at the Century of Progress, is attracting crowds to the Communications Building.

Map Shows Path of Calls
The arrangements of the Bell System for the demonstration of long distance telephony are typical of its service. Arrangements have been made to give demonstration calls to the visitors. Fifty-four important cities, one or more in each state, are shown on a huge map, and calls are made to any of these and to the suburban towns in their immediate metropolitan areas. A visitor may call a friend in any one of these cities. On the map a streak of light shows the progress of the call. Only a few seconds are required before the connections are made and the distant telephone bell rung. Not only is the rapidity of the service demonstrated, but the quick response of the operators along the route is shown. About thirty-five visitors at a time can listen to the genuine telephone conversations.
