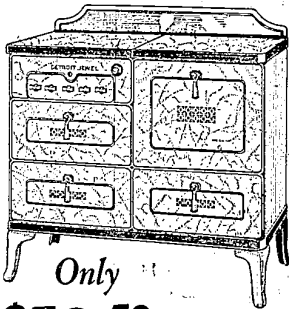

**Sweet Potatoes In Farmington—And How!**

Some folks said sweet potatoes "couldn't be grown" in Michigan, leastwise around this part of the State. So Frank Parsons has done it, just to show them.

Mr. Parsons brought into the Enterprise office this week and now has on display in the Fred L. Cook and Co. show-window, sweet potatoes measuring 9 and 11 inches long, grown in his own garden. And if you question whether they were raised in Farmington, the answer is that they were grown so close to the City's own building that the shadow of the structure must have almost reached the garden at certain times of the day. One of the potatoes, nine inches long and three inches in diameter, weighs well over a pound.

The potatoes had their origin, however, in Napanee, Indiana, where Mr. Parsons' brother-in-law, Dr. L. C. Thayer, resides. He sent the plants to Farmington, where Mr. Parsons put them in and made 'em grow.
