Red Cross Again Asks Sewing Aid

The Oakland County chapter,
 American Red Cross has been al-
 lotted about 85,000 yards of cloth
 for welfare relief purposes.

Various groups are being asked
 to again sew for Red Cross. Many
 garments were distributed in
 Farmington Township last year.

Persons not belonging to any
 organization and wishing to sew
 may obtain garments from Mrs.
 Norman Lee.

Made 56,584 Garments
 "The immensity of the program
 can be visualized by the fact that
 last year the Red Cross volunteers
 completed 56,584 garments which
 were distributed to welfare agen-
 cies throughout Oakland county
 according to their relief needs.

In addition, factory made gar-
 ments in amount of 59,079 were
 distributed, making a total of
 115,663 garments distributed by
 the Red Cross since the begin-
 ning of cotton distribution pro-
 gram.

With exception of shoes the
 Red Cross relief clothing filled
 most of the welfare needs in the
 county.

The sewing project is conduct-
 ed in close co-operation with the
 county, municipal and local gov-
 ernmental welfare agencies.

Lansing, Mich.—The financial
 responsibility law, which becomes
 effective October 17, should be
 studied carefully by every motor-
 ist. The act, besides providing that
 motorists involved in accidents be
 able to pay damages, also make it
 compulsory upon the Department
 of State to suspend all licenses
 and registrations upon conviction
 of any of the six major offenses
 in the motor vehicle operators
 license law.

Even though an automobile
 owner has satisfied the financial
 requirements of the act, he might
 still be prohibited from driving
 because of the mandatory revoca-
 tion of his license.

\$70 Makes Of Cars

Lansing, Mich.—Few persons
 have any accurate idea of the
 number of different makes of
 automobiles and trucks that have
 been manufactured since the
 automobile was invented. The
 average guess is 125. Files of the
 Department of State contain the
 names of 870 different varieties of
 automobiles and trucks. These
 files constitute a permanent rec-
 ord of every motor licensed to op-
 erate in Michigan.

Smallest Bird in the World

The smallest known bird is the hum-
 ming bird. It is found only in the
 New world, of which it is a native.
 It ranges from the Strait of Magellan,
 at the southern tip of South America,
 to Alaska. There are 48 different
 kinds of these birds, but only 16 kinds
 are found north of Mexico. There is
 only one kind found east of the Mis-
 sissippi river and north of Florida.
 This is the common ruby-throated
 humming bird which is familiar
 throughout the eastern half of the
 United States and Canada.

Canals and Islands of Venice

The 120 canals of Venice divide the
 city into 117 large and small islands,
 and access from one island to another
 is gained by bridge of which there
 are about 350. Of this number only
 three cross the Grand canal, among
 them the famous Rialto bridge, con-
 structed in the sixteenth century. The
 15,000 stone houses and marble palaces
 of the city are built on piles sunk
 into the mud of the once marshy is-
 lands.

An Armada

Armada is Spanish for the Latin
 meaning armament. Specifically, it
 means a fleet of armed ships, the most
 famous being the Spanish armada de-
 stroyed by the English in 1588. Thus,
 an air armada is a fleet of armed air-
 planes, or, generally, any fleet of air-
 ships.

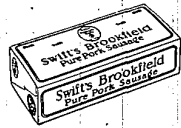

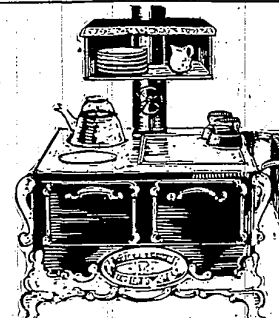
