Hubbard attorney for the plaintiff, it is ordered that the said defendant, Joe Bonome, cause his appearance to be entered herein within three months from the date of this order and that in case of his appearance that he cause his answer to the Bill of Complaint to be filed and a copy thereof to be served on said attorney for the plaintiff within fifteen days after service on him of a copy of said bill of complaint; and notice of this order to be mailed to the defendant's last known address by registered mail.

AND it is further ordered that within forty days the said plaintiff cause a notice of this order to be published in the Farmington Enterprise, a newspaper printed, published and circulated in said County, once a week for six weeks in succession, or that she cause a copy of this order to be personally served on said nonresident defendant at least twenty days before the time above prescribed for his appearance.
