

TWO OF GREATEST OPERA STARS ON FESTIVAL LIST

Lucresia Bori and Rosa Ponselle two of the outstanding singers of the generation, both stars of the Metropolitan Opera Association, will appear in miscellaneous programs at the 1934 May Festival, May 9, 10, 11, and 12, Hill Auditorium, Ann Arbor, according to an announcement just made by President Charles A. Sink.

Other distinguished artists included in the Festival roster are Jeannette Vreeland, an outstanding American oratorio and concert soprano; Coe Glade, a leading contralto of the Chicago Civic Opera Association; Paul Althouse, distinguished tenor, whose debut at the Metropolitan Opera House last Saturday afternoon in Don Giovanni was so spectacular; Arthur Hackett, of Paris Opera fame, and well known throughout the land, now of the University School of Music Faculty, tenor; Theodore Webb, brilliant baritone of concert and oratorio fame; Chase Baromeo, bass, of Chicago, LaScala and Buenos Aires Operas; Cullis Bustabo, renowned young violinist; and Mischa Levitzki, Russian pianist, who has twice before been heard in Ann Arbor.

The Chicago Symphony Orchestra, with Frederick Stock and Assistant Conductor Eric Delamar, the University Choral Union, under the baton of Earl V. Moore, and the Young People's Festival Chorus, led by Juva Higbee, will participate. Choral works which

Dr. Moore will conduct include, Beethoven's "Ninth Symphony," Haydn's "Seasons" and the American premiere of Robert Heger's "Ein Friedenslied" (Song of Spring) which is being specially translated into English and reprinted for this performance.

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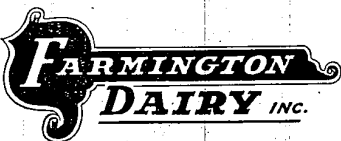
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
