and now where could he get the best of materials and workmanship to fit it out? If it had to be the best, and the price didn't matter so much, but of course, since everything was to be paid for, he ought to be able to get the best figures on everything.

He "Traded at Home"

Naturally, everything would be bought in town if the right stuff could be obtained, because the newcomer was to be one of the town's new business-men, and of course wanted to "trade at home."

So one merchant got an order for the floor-covering he had to order it special himself, because he had nothing quite good enough on hand—it was the fanciest in-laid stuff that was wanted. And he got a handsome order for drapes and more special for the booths (there were to be a number of booths, each one for a separate division of beauty culture, one for manicuring, one for finger-waving, another for permanents, another for facials, etc.).
