FORD GREET'S DEALERS OVER WIRE NETWORK

When Henry Ford addressed his representatives and dealers in 33 American and nine Canadian cities recently, he spoke over the largest countrywide telephone network of public address systems that has yet been connected. The talk was made to an audience of about 40,000, and concerned the prospects and plans for the automobile business during the year 1934.

The listeners were assembled in hotel ballrooms, theatres and similar meeting places in forty-two cities, ranging from Halifax, Nova Scotia, to Los Angeles and from Vancouver, B. C., to Jacksonville, Fla. The audience consisted of some 9,000 dealers, 17,000 salesmen and over 15,000 other members of the dealer's organizations.

In addition to Mr. Ford's remarks, there were talks by Edsel Ford, President of the Ford Motor Company, Wallace B. Beamer, President of the Ford Company of Canada, and others. A musical program which originated in Cleveland was also brought into the hook-up.

About 50,000 circuit miles of telephone wire were used in establishing this network.

Fourteen Islands Form Cape Verde Archipelago

Fourteen islands, ten of which are inhabited, make up the Cape Verde archipelago. They lie about 300 miles west of Dakar, the westernmost city of the African continent. All are of volcanic origin.

The islands are swept almost constantly by swift winds, and both the slopes of their lofty, extinct volcanoes, and the sea shore appear bleak and arid from the Atlantic.

The archipelago forms a province of Portugal, and its governor general is appointed by the Portuguese government. He resides at Porto Praia on St. Thimo, a city of about 35,000 inhabitants, of whom most are negroes. —Chicago Daily News.

Asbestos Was Found When Needed by the Country

Just when civilized folk began most to need it, asbestos was found, notes a writer in the Washington Star.

In the very nick of time, when we began to melt metals in fiery furnaces and to use red-hot machinery in thousands of factories, we learned of a substance which could be obtained from ordinary rock which would protect us from heat because it neither burns nor melts.

Asbestos is used practically everywhere today. In our homes, we have it in our kitchens in the shape of "hot handles" and it shields the pipes of our furnaces. Sometimes it is blown into the very walls of our houses to make them fireproof.

When the earth's crust first hardened into rock, millions and millions of years ago, some of the veins in the rock were filled with a stuff called serpentine. It is this serpentine which is the mother of asbestos.

Mined from rock in Georgia and Canada, serpentine is ground up into soft white pulpy stuff which is very light and quite tough. The pulp is then broken up, cleaned and carded like wool for weaving into cloth. Ordinarily, the wires are woven into the cloth with the threads of asbestos, which, being rock crystal, would otherwise be too brittle to be durable.

Milk Industry In State of Confusion

or the housewife a cotton-dress, or pay his taxes and interest, something is seriously wrong and needs rectifying."

"What is Fair Price" Former Senator Lennon said that "what we want to find out today is, what is a fair price for milk in Michigan at the present time."

"Our sales committee," he said voted almost unanimously for \$1.35 for 3.5 milk. We're here to find out if this is the real sentiment of Michigan milk producers."

"In the reports in the newspapers nothing is said about the expense that comes out of price before the farmer gets anything... Consumers get an erroneous impression," Sen. Lennon professed not to understand "why we can't get the truth across to the Consumers."

He continued: "The Milk Commission appointed by Gov. Bruckner in 1931 was composed of Detroit people a judge, a clubwoman, a sec'y of Board of Commerce. They were unanimous on one thing: that the average cost of production of milk in Michigan was \$2.20 at that time. All agreed on it... At that time, the average cost of hauling milk to Detroit was 50c per 100 lbs. so the producers should have received

\$2.70 to give them the cost of production... The report of Ruff and Lennon urged a price of \$2.31 per cwt. They attacked what they termed "the bottle racket" and said eliminating it would add a cent a quart or 4c cents a hundred pounds to the farmer's income without taking anything out of the dealers."

"Plan To Cut Surplus" A plan was advanced to reduce the large surplus of milk. This would be to divide each milkshed into seven equal districts, each district to keep its milk at home one day a week. A tariff on oleomargarine was requested.

Those present were invited, at the close of the meeting, to sign a petition urging the Federal Milk Administrator to deny any license to the Michigan Milk Producers Association, and revoke all licenses until its constitution and by-laws are drastically changed and a new election is held. The petition was brought to the attention of the meeting by Walter M. Nelson of Detroit, and was read by Wesley Reid of Milan.

Union Local To Meet The Farmington local of the Michigan Farmer's Union will meet again Thursday evening, March 8, at the Farmington Town Hall. Speakers not yet announced, but will probably be farmers with previous experience in Union work.
