Whether you do your housework or have it done, the bane of most homemakers existence is the unexpected demand for a "Tuffy Meal".
Just to prove to some of the doubting Thomases and Thomases that a "Tuffy Meal" need not be a make-shift, let me tell what Jane's meal was ready, and "was Dick came rushing home from the office an hour earlier that they might take a spin down the river road to enjoy its beauties at twilight."
Dick thought it a pleasant surprise and it was all of that to Jane. However, she is one of those rare souls who always seems equal to any occasion. The fact that Dick fairly loathes eating out and that she hadn't started dinner, did not ruffle her one bit. By the time she had gotten into some comfortable clothes and had "slicked-up" a bit, Jan's meal was ready, and was Dick pleased! Here is what she served.

Easy Meal Menu
(If Dick is in a BIG hurry, you can subtract the salad or dessert)
Chilled Canned Grapefruit,
*Tuna Patties with Tomato Sauce,
Battered Ham, Head Lettuce with Mayonnaise Dressing, Pineapple Slices, *Cookies, Coffee.
*Tuna Patties with Tomato Sauce
2 cups flaked Tuna Fish,
12 soda crackers, crumbled,
2 tablespoons hot milk,
1/2 teaspoon salt,
1/2 teaspoon grated lemon peel,
1/2 teaspoon mustard,
2 tablespoons melted butter,
2 eggs, well beaten,
1 can tomato sauce.

Mix all ingredients together, except the tomato soup. Shape into cakes, roll in eggs and crumbs, if desired, and sauté until brown on both sides. Heat the tomato soup and serve with the Tuna Patties as tomato sauce.

***Corn Flake Drops**
1/2 cup butter,
1 cup brown sugar
2 eggs,
2 tablespoons milk,
1 1/4 cups flour,
2 teaspoons baking powder,
1/4 teaspoon salt,
4 cups corn flakes,
1 teaspoon almond flavoring.
Cream butter and sugar together. Add well-beaten eggs and milk. Sift flour with baking powder. Drop from a spoon on an oiled baking-sheet and bake in a moderate oven of 350° F. for 10 minutes.

***Brownies**
1 cup sugar,
1/4 cup softened butter,
2 eggs,
2 squares chocolate,
1/2 cup flour,
1/4 teaspoon salt,
1/2 teaspoon vanilla,
1/4 cup chopped nut meats.
To the sugar add the softened butter, well-beaten eggs, and melted chocolate. Beat thoroughly and add the other ingredients. Spread mixture in lined pan with waxed paper. Bake in a moderate oven. Cut in squares.

Moisture in Grass, Plants

A Meal in One Dish
When you find it necessary to improvise a dinner from just what you happen to have in the house, you to your horror discover your emergency shelf has suddenly become a first cousin to Old Mother Hubbard's Cupboard, just keep your nerve and resort to some old kitchen-ways. With a can of beans and a bit of discretion it is entirely possible and even easy, to contrive almost an entire meal in one dish.

Kilney Beans Italian
5 strips bacon,
1 onion, chopped,
2 cups kidney beans, canned,
2 cups spaghetti, cooked or canned,
1 can tomato soup,
1/2 cups American Cheese, grated,
Salt,
Pepper.
Cut bacon in small pieces and cook with onion for 5 minutes. Add to the beans, spaghetti, soup, grated cheese and seasoning to taste. Pour into a casserole, cover with remaining grated cheese, and bake in a moderate oven of 350 degrees F. for about 30 minutes.

Now for the Trimmings
With such a meal-in-one dish, all that is needed to round out a dinner menu is a simple dessert of canned Grapefruit sections, or a gelatine dessert containing a pappy fruit, some cookies and coffee.

When Insects Fast
The bureau of entomology says there are many insects that normally never feed or drink in the imago stage, although many of these are capable of doing so.
