Official Highway Map Is Being Distributed

Lansing—The 1934 official Michigan highway map, issued by the State Highway Department is ready for distribution. Commissioner Murray D. Van Vagoner announces. The map is for free distribution only and copies can be obtained by calling at the Highway Department's office in Lansing or by written request.

Fifty thousand copies of the map have been purchased by the Michigan Tourist and Resort Commission for distribution as a part of its program in advertising Michigan this year.

The new map contains a number of changes and improvements over the 1933 map. A distinctive feature of the map is the accordion fan fold which makes it easy to use, especially in automobiles.

The map stresses Michigan's tourist and resort attractions. The entire reverse side is devoted to pictures and stories on the state's vacation advantages.

State trunk line highways are shown in a dark red, principal county roads in blue, state forests and game refuges in green, and water in deep blue, while the background is yellow.

Other information on the face of the map is a chart giving the mileage between 104 Michigan cities. Population of municipalities also is indicated. The state ferry schedule and rates also are listed.

The reverse side of map is given over to 21 representative highways and scenic views of Michigan and stories on Michigan's tourist and resort appeal and outdoor life and history. Listed also are "the rules of the road," and a table showing the location and facilities of the state parks.
