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Ant and Man

Our sense of superiority to no doubt partly due to our worship of mere size: Aristotle himself would not have cut much ice had he been only the size of an ant. Further, Pomm and Casary say, we regard insects as very low forms of life, whereas, actually, they are as far advanced in the evolutionary scale—as are ourselves. That is, we are the highest developed of those animals that put their money on a vertebral internal skeleton, while the ant is one of the most highly-developed of those animals that backed on a segmented body covered with chitin. But both are an equal distance along the road from our original common ancestor, and if a stable and masterful relationship with the environment is a fair gauge of progress there are many ways in which the ant has made a better use of its time than man.

Holiest Monks' Retreat

Inaccessible retreats once inhabited by "the holiest monks" have been unearthed in the desert sand some ten miles from the Wadi Natrun, Egypt. The traveler, who carried out the excavations, claims to have located the site of the hitherto undiscovered district of Oella, where early Christian monks lived so far apart they could neither see nor hear one another. The only occasions on which they met were on Saturdays and Sundays, when they assembled at the church—a central building which this authority claims to have identified about ten miles from the northwest corner of the Wadi Natrun.

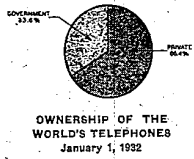
Where Ebony Grows

Ebony is the wood of a number of related trees, found in nearly all parts of the tropical world. Its northernmost range is northern Bengal, in India, and in localities of similar latitude and climate. The best grades are from a certain species native to southern India and Ceylon. Another much appreciated variety is from Madagascar. Other places where ebony grows are in Africa, especially Angola; in the East Indies, and the poorer Jamaica variety in the West Indies.

U. S. Has More Than Half of World's Telephones; Nearly 16 to 100 Population

North America has about twice as many telephones as Europe. Asia has twice as many telephones as South America. Africa has approximately half as many telephones as there are in Australia. There were in the entire world, as of January 1, 1932, in the vicinity of 35,000,000 telephones, of which about 22 per cent can be reached from any Bell or Bell-connecting telephone in this country.

Telephone statistics for the entire world are gathered annually, the latest date for which comparable figures are available being January 1, 1932. These figures show 19,650,



187 telephones in the United States, or 53.17 per cent of the world's total. Canada has 1,364,200 telephones, or 3.59 per cent, and is outranked in number of telephones only by the United States, Germany, and Great Britain. Figures for the latter country include Northern Ireland but not the Irish Free State.

In North America, Mexico takes third rank in number of telephones, and is followed by Cuba. Taking into account the other countries of Central America and the West Indies, North America has 66.69 per cent of the world's telephones. Telephone development in South America has been hampered by geographical and other causes, but substantial gains are being made.

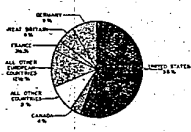
Argentina has more telephones than any other country on the continent with Brazil standing in second place, followed by Chile, Uruguay, Colombia and Venezuela in the order named. The other South American countries have but a few thousand telephones each, excepting Peru with 14,632.

In Europe, Germany outranks every other nation, with a total of 3,143,655 telephones. Next comes Great Britain and Northern Ireland, with 2,650,056; and France, with 1,233,879. Sweden has 560,605 telephones, which is a much better showing than the figures indicate, because, on a population basis Sweden outranks every other European country with the single exception of Denmark. Both Russia and Italy have in the vicinity of 450,000 telephones.



In Asia, Japan has a commanding lead over all other countries, with China holding second place. British India has 54,500 telephones. In Africa, the Union of South Africa leads. In Oceania, Australia, with about 500,000 telephones, and New Zealand with over 100,000 account in large measure for the number of instruments included in that section of the globe.

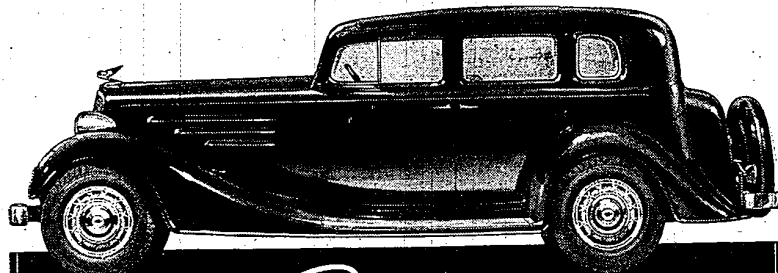
In recent years there has been a great increase, not alone in the United States, but throughout the world, in dial telephones. Slightly more than 60 per cent of all the telephones now in use are located in the United States, and the number of such instruments throughout the world totals 12,500,000. Telephone development, however,



is a question not merely of the actual number of telephones in use but also of the number in proportion to population. On this basis, averaging telephones per 100 of the world's population, the United States takes first place, with Canada second, Denmark third, New Zealand fourth, Sweden fifth, Switzerland sixth, Australia seventh, and Norway eighth. Figures for the United States show 15.8 telephones for each hundred of its population, and for Canada 13.1. For the entire world, there are 1.5 telephones for each hundred of population.

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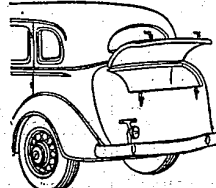
