**Bank Meeting Of 1932  
Reverberates To 1934**  
(Continued From Page One)

Reorganized a state bank which was not approved by the State Banking Department.

\$2,080 From 35 Banks

I understand that it is intended to convey the idea that in the thirty-five State and National banks which appealed to us for assistance, I was interested in the fact that in over three-quarters of them we made no charge whatever and even paid our own expenses. The entire total of all of the fees our firm received for the thirty-five State and National banks we served at their request, including many other banks whom we counseled over the telephone and by correspondence, over the full period of three years, was but \$2,080 from ten of them and nothing from twenty-five of them, and we paid our own expenses, in all of the twenty-five banks and most of the others. In the twenty-two State banks which sought our assistance, we received a total compensation of \$950.00 from a total of five of them and nothing from seventeen of the State banks. Never in any instance did we receive any compensation which was not either fixed or approved by all of the parties in interest.

Some idea of the service rendered and our fees can be gleaned from the fact that when two large State and National banks in Traverse City were in the utmost distress and in an extremely precarious situation, on a sudden call I drove

260 miles across the State, to Traverse City and with the National and State bank examiners, examined their condition and affairs and necessary charge-offs, and devised a program for saving these institutions, held directors' and stockholders' meetings of both banks, and in the evening a joint depositors' meeting of over 1800 stockholders and depositors. Securing the unanimous approval of all parties in interest to a successful reorganization involving the consolidation of these two large banks into one state bank, returning the following day with another drive of 260-miles. And thereafter during the following month by telephone and correspondence from Detroit, I supervised the details of that reorganization and consolidation which were successfully made and for which service our firm received a fee for our work of \$150.00 from each bank, or a total of \$300.00, which was the maximum figure I set as being willing to accept.

I felt very proud of our work for the State and National banks and we regarded it as a public service. And in that service in every instance we considered the interest of the depositors first without exception. These banks were in a desperate situation; no one seemed to know what to do to solve the problems of bank runs, a want of liquidity and shrinkage of assets. At the beginning there was no National or State law whatever on the subject. I myself devised the cooperative plan for the reorganization of our state banks, the fundamentals of which were afterwards incorporated into the laws of this State during the administration of Governor Brucker. Not a single bank or trust company in this State has ever been organized by the State Banking Department except under and by virtue of a law which I adopted and carried out the method of reorganization which I myself devised.

ceived is correct, it seems mightly small thanks that for political purposes, those opposed to my candidacy would have the audacity, because they are in positions of official influence, to use the State Banking Department and Attorney General's Office at the expense of the taxpayers of this State, and probably spend as much or more of the taxpayers' money trying to investigate me and my firm, in the hope of making political capital out of it, than my firm received for all of the work that we have done in behalf of the depositors and other parties in interest in these country banks for the past three years. Least of all, such an attack should not come from this administration because since the beginning of this administration on January 1, 1933, everything I or my firm have done for the country state banks has been done without any compensation whatever.

"Get Facts Straight"

I welcome any investigation you care to make, but, in view of the information I have received, I want to suggest that in your activity and the publicity connected with it, you be sure to get facts straight this time and present them fairly, and not continue to be so presumptive upon my good nature that you will mislead the public by their manner of presentation, and, in practical effect, incite libel on our firm and myself, as was done in relation to our compensation work in the reorganization of the Detroit Trust Company, which I dare to say is one of the finest pieces of constructive legal service that was ever rendered for a state institution in this country and of which my firm and I feel very proud and for which we have no apologies. I wish here to renew the request made to you that you make public immediately the true report of Assistant Attorney General Judson E. Richardson, who investigated this matter, whatever that report may be.
