TRAPNET FISHERMEN ARE CAUSING ALARM
The migration of deep trapnet fishermen from Harbor Beach and other points on Lake Huron to the southern half of Lake Michigan has greatly alarmed pond and gillnet fishermen along the lower east shore of the lake.
Local organizations are being formed by fishermen in several localities to urge legislation that would ban entirely the use of the deep trapnet. Pond and gillnet fishermen contend that the use of the deep trapnet is a serious menace to the whitfish resources of Michigan waters.

CODLING MOTHS ARE ACTIVE IN NEARBY ORCHARDS

That the codling moth is again active is indicated by the fact that Franklin Sherman, of Farmington, who has a number of bait pots in apple orchards, reported that he obtained the largest catch of moths this season on August 17, 18, 19 and 20, according to K. D. Bailey, of Pontiac, County agricultural agent.

The moths lay their eggs during the night-time when the temperature reaches 62 degrees Fahrenheit, or more. The eggs hatch a few days afterward. Growers are warned by Mr. Bailey to spray their fruit at once.

In case the owner intends to wash with chemicals, the spray should consist of three pounds of lead arsenate and four pounds of hydrated lime in 100 gallons of water, Bailey said.

Conservation Subjects To Be Treated On Radio

It may not be so easy for visitors to the "open" conservation officer in the woods this fall.

The old-style dress caps by which the officers were easily distinguished while on patrol duty will not be seen. New-type felt hats of conventional style will be worn instead.

For several years conservation officers have favored a change in headgear. They have wanted something that would distinguish them from bus drivers and gas station attendants, something that would be more comfortable as well as practical in the woods. The original caps often caught on branches and had a habit of blowing off in the wind and blowing across the icy surface of a lake, according to the Department of Conservation.

The new hat is patterned after that worn by federal foresters rangers and is of a color to match the uniform. The cap is being retained for use on dress occasions.

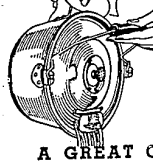
Peach Borer Should Be Controlled Early

Control measures for the peach tree borer should be used early in September to make certain that temperatures are high enough to volatilize the chemical used, according to the entomology department at Michigan State College.
The adult peach tree borer is a small wasp-like moth which flies in the daytime. The females lay from 200 to 800 eggs each on or near the trunks of peach trees.

The larvae, which injure the tree by boring inside the trunk, are tiny creatures no thicker than a thread when they start work but they increase in size until they are an inch long. Their presence in the trees can be detected by the gummy secretion which appears on the tree trunk at the outside end of the tunnel which the larvae have made. Several larvae working in one tree may cause enough damage to make the tree worthless.

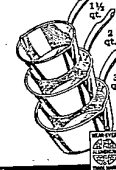
