WARNING GIVEN TO HUNTERS AGAINST CARELESS ACTIONS

Lansing, October 3.—Michigan hunters who plan to be afield during the small-game season are warned by the Department of Conservation against carelessness with firearms.
During the past several years many hunters have met death through their own carelessness or that of a hunting companion. Almost all gun accidents can be avoided by observance of the well-known rules of safety while hunting.

Records of hunting accidents have been kept by the Department of Conservation since 1929. The records show that the accident toll during the past five hunting seasons was 112 dead and 176 injured.
Of the total deaths 77 occurred during the small-game hunting seasons and 35 during the deer hunting seasons. The small-game hunters injured number 110; deer hunters 66.
