With dramatic motion pictures that required 18 months of danger and \$50,000 to film, Chester Scott Howland of New Bedford will tell the exciting story of the whale fishermen in an illustrated lecture on "Hunting Whales," at 3:30 on Sunday afternoon, October 14, at the Detroit Institute of Arts.

Then, in vivid succession, come breath-taking movies of the mighty seas that sweep the whaling grounds, of stalwart seamen in tossing dories, of slender harpoons hurtling through the air, of struggles to the death with infuriated fifty-ton whales.
