Mr. and Mrs. Harold McCracken and Mrs. Sooby of Detroit spent Saturday with Mr. and Mrs. Harry McCracken.

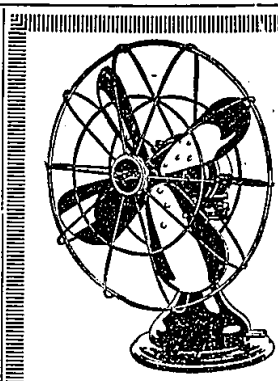

French Horn Once Banned in Some Musical Circles

The French horn is one of the most valuable and difficult wind instruments in the orchestra. It has a slender, conical, flared bell, wound round in coils upon itself, and consists of four principal parts—the body, the crooks, the mouthpiece and slides.

The body is the main tube, the crooks are interchangeable spiral tubes of varying length which enter the pitch and key of the instrument; the mouthpiece is different from other wind instruments in that it is funnel-shaped and not cup-shaped.

The slides are pairs of sliding tubes by means of which the instrument may be tuned.

The horn is also equipped with three valves to be operated by the player in producing the various tones in the scale.

The tone of the horn is mellow, rich and sonorous and is distinguished at the same time by a certain human quality which is vastly different from all other members of the brass section.

The origin of the horn must be sought in prehistoric times, when, says an authority in the Washington Post, by breaking off the tip of a short animal's horn, or at best two notes were obtained. This was undoubtedly the origin of the horn that was developed later and used in the symphony orchestra. It seems strange to think that the horn was opposed at first, for now it is heard in nearly every orchestral piece. Yet when it first entered the orchestra it was considered coarse and out of place with the more delicate violins and cellos.
