McCalliffe plays golf and mightily good golf without either arm. It's something to ponder over. Words fail to describe this unusual performer. He must be seen to be appreciated.

Tommy laughs at bunkers and traps as well as bad lies. His scores are better than 70% of players at any course. For grit and determination applied to practical purposes we nominate Tommy as the shining example.

Losses Arms He suffered the loss of both arms when a lad of nine, when he fell in front of a heavy laden stone car which covered both arms just below the shoulder. He was in the hospital but two weeks and a day and was then brought out ever since. He returned to school and class-room. Write! He does that by holding pencil or pen in his mouth—although he originally learned to write by holding these markers between his right shoulder and neck. Either way he writes 35 to 40 words per minute.
