State Tests New Forest Fire Fighting Device

Even Paul Bunyan, that legendary slant of the northwoods, would have been envious of Michigan's newest piece of fire-fighting equipment.

When the famous Paul wished to build a fireline or trail, he merely dragged his paw through the woods, and the new four-wheel drive truck at Michigan's Forest Fire Experiment station does a far more finished and effective job.

The capacity of the new truck is regarded as prodigious in comparison to the standard equipment, since it can do the work of five or six ordinary tractor-drawn units in a single day. It can maintain 30 miles of fireline or truck trail in approximately 21 hours and perform a finished job in a single operation. The truck has an underslung disc and four rubber tires.

In testing the unit, the Experiment station again proved its worth. It afforded the skilled and experienced men facilities necessary to give the unit a thorough trial so that its qualities could be adequately tested before purchase. The unit was bought by the Department of Conservation with a view to the enormous amount of maintenance work that will become necessary when truck trails and fire lines built and maintained by CCC labor will come under the administration of the Department.

The Shetland Sheep Dog
Like the shaggy Shetland pony, the sturdy little Shetland dog is but a dwarfed version of their larger relatives on the mainland. In conformity they differ from the typical show collie only in minor points, that is, the Shetland sheepdog's head is less long, the face less aquiline and the texture of the coat more silky. The pasting colors are similar—black and white, golden sable and white, or black, white and tan. The white markings are evenly distributed in the profuse neck frill, the collar, the blaze up the face, on the legs and feet and often at the tip of the substantial, heavily feathered bush. Seen at their best, they are graceful, agile, altogether beautiful little dogs.

"Mocha" Coffee
Coffee was originally shipped from the Port of Mocha, Arabia, on the Red sea, to which it owes the name "Mocha." But for about 200 years nothing has been shipped from that port, which has been closed by drifting sand. This name, however, has clung ever since to a certain kind of high-grade coffee. Abyssinia now ships a grade of Mocha, and much of that kind of coffee is shipped from Aden, Arabia. Traders from Turkey and Egypt go to Arabia, buy the crops on the tree, and supervise their picking and preparation.
