Kids Give Indians Yule Treat

A lot of Observeland youngsters today are bringing happiness to literally

thousands of Indians in the northern part of Michigan's lower peninsula.

A truckload of food, school supplies and toys was taken northward this morning by Hank Chrusciel, who heads the Indian Affairs Committee of the Western Wayne County Conservation Assn.

While many adults and businessmen had a hand in the effort, the biggest thrust of this season's giving came from youngsters, particularly student and scout groups.

Their gifts will go to the Holy Childhood Indian Mission school at Harbor Springs and to residents of Cross Village to the north of Chrusciel, who stored the gifts in his garage at 1345 Brentwood, Livonia, compiled this list of efforts:

GIRLS IN Cadet Troops 194 and 919 in Livonia, under the leadership of Suzanne Portman and Beverly Cairn, collected 450 cans of food by placing baskets at the AAA office in Farmington, Elias supermarket and the home of the Indian Affairs Committee.

St. Collette Catholic Parish Women's Guild of Livonia, Beta Sigma Phi sorority of Livonia and Den 4 of Cub Pack 1117 of Dearborn all helped.

Boy Scout Timothy Sessions of Troop 142 in Livonia, working on his eagle rank service project, collected food, clothing and toys.

Through the efforts of Joan Smith of Livonia, the Ford Motor Co. Girls Club, on short notice, collected 438 cans of food.

Countless girl scouts collected food, clothing and toys.

CLARENCEVILLE students collected food as the price of admission to their annual holiday concert under the direction of Carol Hornung and got 1,000 cans. Many items were collected by Mrs. Mildred Burgill, a Clarenceville teacher.

A group of teen girls from Northville who wished to remain anonymous bought and wrapped 22 gifts.

Ray Herbert of Montgomery Ward's Wonderland store contributed many toys, as did another large store which asked to remain anonymous.

Workers at the Livonia city dump saved bicycle parts to use in repairs and for reassembly.

Ryder Truck Rental donated use of a truck, and Ed Goldstein of Livonia collected toys and clothing and helped in many ways.

The load will be a bit smaller than usual, Chrusciel said, because a group of Indians from Berrien Springs recently was given a 16-foot vanload and trailerful of food, toys and clothing.

OU Offers 5 New Business Courses

ROCHESTER Five new evening noncredit management courses begin the week of January 17 at Oakland University's Division of Continuing Education.

Negotiating and administering the labor agreement on Wednesday provides a brief historical background of the labor movement and a basic understanding of labor legislation. Frederick R. Shedd, of Fred Shedd and Associates, uses case histories to place the main emphasis on negotiating techniques and subsequent administration of the agreement through the arbitration process.

Organizational responses to change, also Wednesday, examines the responses of industrial organizations to social change, federal government regulations, legal and social responsibilities concerning drugs and civil disturbance. Anthony O. Smith, representative for salaried personnel at General Motors Corp., also covers employment and social responsibilities dealing with women and minorities.

OPERATIONS and the people who do them, Wednesday, is for managers and executives in industry with the desire and need to know the other man's job. Robert C. Kennedy, chairman, divisional change board, GM truck and coach division, provides a total overview of staff departments, their responsibilities, tasks and interaction.

Effective executive presentations, directed by Carleton S. Ryding, editor for The Bill Sandy Co., includes

organization of material, professional delivery techniques, personality projection, use of visual aids and effective communication skills. Videotape replays are an important part of this Monday course.

Facility planning workshop, Wednesday, instructed by Bengt L. Swenson, architect-designer, Skanskahouse Design, looks at new systems, structures, management and environmental factors in institutional and commercial organizations and the factors involved in designing facilities to be more flexible and human goal oriented.

Additional management courses offered include: Realistic management; management philosophy; the language of management; personnel management; office administration; updating today's executive; value control and data processing for management.

Rep. McDonald Wants Officers' Rights Assured

WASHINGTON U.S. Rep. Jack McDonald (R-Farmington) has co-sponsored an amendment to require the establishment of a "Law Enforcement Officers Bill of Rights."

If enacted, it would provide staff departments, their statutory protection for the constitutional rights and privileges of local law enforcement officers, units of local governments and public agencies operating in the state.
