EGG GRADING REGULATIONS POSTPONED

LANSING—Egg grading regulations recently promulgated by Commissioner of Agriculture James P. Thomson, to become effective Nov. 1, will not become effective for at least 60 days, the commissioner announced recently.

Meanwhile Thomson is working on a plan whereby he hopes to enforce the egg grading regulations without charging a service fee from those who deal in eggs, a plan recommended to the department by a committee representing producers, consumers, wholesalers and retailers of eggs. Thomson leaves the present for the department of agriculture can possibly enforce the regulations without the service fee charge.

The regulations call for grading the weight and grade to be stamped on all packages sold to the consumer. The regulations which were to become effective next month call for a \$2 fee for all retailers handling eggs and a \$25 fee for all wholesalers.

Eggs may still be sold under the new regulations by the dozen. Commissioner Thomson revealed in answer to hundreds of inquiries that he is flooding his office, but will call packages of eggs must carry the "E" weight and grade in letters not less than one-half inch in height.

"This is simply an advanced step in the marketing of Michigan farm products and will be a great benefit not only to the producer but to the consumer as well," Commissioner Thomson said.

Saying housewives will benefit materially by the plan, he added: "The average housewife would not consider buying bananas by the dozen today, knowing well that bananas vary in size to such an extent that purchasing by weight is the only fair method. The same should apply to eggs. No doubt most eggs purchased by the con-

sumer will be in packages containing one dozen, but will be graded with the weight stamped on each package. This is only fair to all concerned."

STATE TO HAVE CENTRAL FILE ON AUTO ACCIDENTS

Possibly the most powerful weapon the state of Michigan may ever possess in its war against unfit or dangerous drivers, is being built up in steel filing cabinets in the Department of State where a central violations file is being assembled. Reports have been requested from every prosecuting attorney in the state, of all convictions for violation of motor vehicle laws, and from every police department in Michigan of all automobile accidents reported to them which result in injury or death.

The ultimate goal of the plan is that the true and complete driving record of every person in the state, licensed to drive or not, shall be available on one card, against which applications for a driver's license can be checked. It is expected that this central violations bureau will be the means of eventually eliminating many dangerous drivers who might never get into serious criminal or civil suits as the result of their mishaps.

The Michigan State Police cooperate fully in building up this file. With complete cooperation of officials throughout the state, it is visualized that if a Detroit man, for example, is involved in a crash in Marquette, for instance, it would be only a matter of routine, a few days later, to enter this fact on his card on the central violations file. He would be confronted with his record when he applied for his driver's license. The Secretary of State may refuse to issue these licenses for cause.

Dr. McGee Honored By Chicago Church

(Continued from page one) the esteem and confidence in which Dr. McGee is held by his congregation.

The inner secret and main objective of this distinguished ministry is best portrayed in verses written by Dr. McGee on the occasion of his completion of twenty-five years of service with the church. These verses were included in a little book of poems collected and published by the Bethany Union Church under the title "Calendrical." After raising the question of accomplishment, as measured by the ordinary statistics of membership, calls made, money received and spent — "Impressive even in times that worship size and bulk and that fat god Success," he answers: "No! No! This people would not have it so."

Nor would it be my pride . . . Perhaps some youth is giving forth in high obedience to a vision led, Seeking so foolishly, a city built of dreams . . . Perhaps a new song some humble toiler sings.

Some fainting one with new strength goes his way; A lonely heart finds solace in his prayer. Light shines again in tired eyes, And crooked path is straightened, A prior door is opened.

Some heavy load is lifted, A new earth and heaven dawn, A life to more abundance grows. All who shared in this occasion must have felt a conviction growing warm in their hearts, that the church is not to be despaired of so long as such ministries can perform and such relationships be maintained—church and minister agreeing well and building a temple full of the sense of ancient and enduring things, and gifts of wonder, beauty and of peace."

Dr. McGee was born in Farmington, Mich. He attended the University of Michigan and the divinity school at the University of Chicago where he received a fellowship in history. On June 12, he was awarded an honorary degree of doctor of divinity by the Chicago Theological Seminary.

Unable to attend the reception for Dr. McGee, Hugh Elmer Brown of the First Congregational Church, Evanston, Illinois, sent the following message of congratulations to Dr. and Mrs. McGee:

"First Congregational church of Evanston and its pastor send their congratulations to Bethany Union and the McGees on their silver anniversary. What a wonderful marriage it has turned out to be—for better all the time and never for worse—full of felicities and sunshine. If Clyde McGee were only as good a golfer as he is a pastor, he would make Bobby Jones look like a duff. If he were only as good a putter as he is a poet-preacher, he would be shooting in the low seventies all the time. Pastor, preacher and poet in golden combination, Clyde McGee has given himself royally as a soldier of the common good. His buoyant good cheer, his social sympathy, his refreshing humor, his prophetic insight, his daily pleasantness, his Christian point of view, free from all fat ambiguities and pronounced without fear or favor, his modesty worn like a beautiful robe, and his universal courtesy, make a blend which is 'good to the last drop,' and the last drop is good too. His mind sheds light like the Lindbergh Beacon, his pen drips poetry and his heart pours out friendship. And for what he is, blame Mrs. McGee, with her soft brown eyes and blessed womanhood. Honor him and keep him—raise his salary—buy him some golf lessons—and follow him all the way."
