There is no admission charge.


Included in the program will be several Christmas favorites, "Gaudete," "Agnus Dei," and "Gesu Bambino."

# Women on the Go

## Naturalist Keeps Plenty Of Company

The head lady of the Nankin Mills Nature Center never has a moment to be lonely.

Last year Mary Ellsworth had some 25,000 visitors at the century-old house that serves as headquarters for a 500-acre wildlife preserve.

Some came in classes with their teachers. Others arrived in families. Children in the Westland and Livonia areas wandered in for a visit in the course of a day's summer fun.

And many showed up with stray animals, wild or domesticated, healthy or injured, that needed temporary shelter.



THOSE ANIMALS add dozens more reasons why Mary Ellsworth could never lack company. Mothering assorted strays is one of her main jobs as naturalist at the center.

"The urge to collect is strong in children, they just have to pick things up," she said.

"And when they find an injured bird, or squirrel, or had a water snake out of the pond, we usually get a new boarder."

"Most of them are released eventually—in the spring and summer there's a constant turnover."

fed exhibits, nor are any live creatures from the preserve.

"All mounted exhibits are made from road kills," she said.

Some of the current residents of the center, located at the end of Farmington Road in Westland, include a skunk (deodorized), a possum, a colony of mice.

Outside the building, in cages, are most of the Michigan mammals, a porcupine, a raccoon, a red fox and a bobcat, the latter rarely seen in captivity.

Mary Ellsworth, who makes her home in Westland, enjoys the old building that houses the center, almost as much as its visitors.

The sturdy frame structure was built shortly after the Civil War as a grist mill. The old mill stream from Nankin Lake still flows deep underground beneath the house.

THIS NATURALIST, who studied at Michigan State University and worked in a museum there and at the Cranbrook Institute of Science, began her work with the nature center when the Wayne County Road Commission took it over in 1956. The commission still is the agency operating the center.

It took about 1 1/2 years to change the building from a one-time factory to nature exhibit home, and Miss Ellsworth had it ready for the public about 10 years ago. The first year there were about 500 visitors, and the number has grown in great bounds as more and more teachers and families make the trip, and former visitors come back to see the constant changes.

And something new is always on hand there.

One recent addition is sound equipment presented by the Detroit Audubon Society as a memorial to Mrs. Elsie Townsend, long-time biology teacher at Wayne State University.

Other presentations are of the more humble variety.

"A youngster comes in with a bucket of water and a happy smile and I just never know what I'm going to find when I reach my hand into that muddy water," Miss Ellsworth said.

But it's a sure bet she won't stop reaching.


