Ordinance Requires CleanDrains

Farmington Township Trustees have adopted a new ordinance which gives the township power to require the cleaning of drains even though the drainage occurs on an adjacent property.

The ordinance takes effect in 30 months with the provision that no individuals be prosecuted for an additional 90 days.

Covered by the ordinance are "every ditch, stream, water course, swale, sewer, pipe or other conduit of any kind, whether natural or artificial... over which through which surface waters normally pass within the township."

Failure to clean the drainage could result in a fine of up to \$100 and/or a jail sentence of 90 days in the county jail.

Under the provisions of the ordinance, the township engineer must file a report on the condition and then the township board may call for a public hearing on the matter.

While the ordinance cannot require property owners to enlarge their drainage facilities, it does require that the drains not be blocked or damaged.

The ordinance covers all drains in the township.

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Trustees Direct Car Wash Hearing

Farmington Township Trustees directed the Township Planning Commission to hold a public hearing on a rezoning request for an automatic car wash on the southeast corner of 13 Mile and Orchard Lake Road.

The request was denied by

the planners during a preliminary hearing.

HAROLD LARSON,

the attorney for the person seeking the rezoning, appealed the decision to the township board.

He cited the fact that the

parcel of land is right next to

the gas station on the corner

and that it is an "L" shape

and that the frontage on 13 Mile

is very narrow section re-

quiring some special consider-

ation.

Currently the land is zoned

B-4, a business classification

which does not permit car washes.

The zoning classification

requires a service drive with

separated curb cuts from the

roadway.

Car washes are permitted

under B-2 zoning, another busi-

ness classification.

Jack Leland, who has an op-

portunity to purchase the prop-

erty, told the trustees that he pro-

posed to construct a two-bay

self-service car wash on the

site.

The trustees indicated that

they thought there might be

some traffic problems with the

current site plan, but told Lar-

son to file the site plan re-

drawals and take it back to

the township board.

Yes on the question was 4-2

with Trustee Thomas Nichols

abstaining.

Voting in favor of sending

the rezoning proposal back to the

planners were: Township Super-

visor Curtis H. Hall, Town-

ship Clerk Floyd Cairns, Town-

Treasurer Elsie Avery and

Trustee Margaret Schaefer.

Trustees Charles Williams

and Frederick Lichtenau voted

to deny the request.

IN OTHER MATTERS from the planning commission, the board:

Approved the extension of

the apartment zoning along the

southern edge of the present

Hunter's Ridge development at

14 Mile and Orchard Lake Road.

This area was proposed in the

original Hunter's Ridge plan,

but the planning commission

withheld approval of the change

until the project had started de-

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
