

Firemen Receive Largest Pay

Farmington firemen will receive the largest pay for a quarter that has ever been paid in the history of City Clerk Nathan H. Powers, who put the checks in the mail Thursday.

For the months of January, February and March, the Farmington firemen were called on 26 fires, 16 of which were in the Township and 10 of which were in the City. The total amount of the fire checks was \$452.25. The largest check was \$51.75 and the smallest amount \$15.00.

Among the most prominent was the former M. E. Children's home just west of Farmington which was completely razed when firemen

What was known as the old Sprague home southwest of Farmington, considered one of the show places of Oakland county and one of the most impressive homes in this section burned to the ground in a spectacular night fire.

The Malcomson house, which was occupied by the Fitzgerald family and located in the Farmington Woods subdivision east of Farmington was completely gutted by fire with only the cooperation of neighbors and townspeople who saved all the furniture averting a total loss.

In recent weeks the epidemic of building fires has changed over to grass fires.

In connection with grass fires, Oakland county sportsmen's organizations are asking that property owners stop starting grass fires. In addition to the serious fire menace they point out that at this time of the year game birds start nesting in fields and that the annual loss from fire is appalling.
