Charge Postal Accounts

There was a time when it was not necessary to pay cash for stamps used for postage. The postmaster of the United States and of other offices extended credit and sent bills to patrons at the end of the month as our merchants do now, at one time. In the early history of the post-office. One such bill cherished by a Philadelphian reads: "H. Farum & Co., to the Philadelphia post office, to postage for the month of August 1845—\$27.57." The bill carried a memo which said: "It is confidentially expected that bills of postage will be paid by the tenth of the month, and it will greatly facilitate the delivery of letters from the boxes if gentlemen will have the goodness to pay their bills between the hours of 9 a. m. and 5 p. m."
