DAYBREAK EASTER SERVICES PLANNED BY MEMORIAL PARK

One of the most impressive Easter morning services which will be held in Michigan will be the Easter Sunrise service at Michigan Memorial Park at 5:56 o'clock sharp.

The entire program will be held outdoors rain or shine. If the weather is inclement, the audience may remain seated in their cars during the broadcasting.

The program includes a surprised children's choir of one hundred voices, Welch male quartette accompanied by Don Miller at the grand organ, and community singing of old familiar hymns.

The entire program is under the direction of Dr. A. C. Jackson and Rev. George D. Jeffery, pastor of St. Paul's Episcopal Church, Chester J. Sparks will be director of ceremonies.

Michigan Memorial Park is located on Huron River Drive, three and one-half miles west of Flat Rock. There is parking space for 5,000 cars.

Jackie Seedlings Ready for Planting

Twenty-five million young white, Norway and jackie seedlings are in the beds of the state forest nursery here for planting in state forests next fall and during the spring of 1937.

There will be no planting of nursery stock in the state forests this spring, but a seedling will be made at the nursery for plantings to be undertaken in 1937.

Home's Troy Seventh on Same Site to Be Ruined

Home's Troy which the Greeks burned in 1183 B. C., after amassing some of their men inside the city in a wooden horse, was really the seventh city to be destroyed on the same site, according to calculations made by University of Cincinnati archeologists.

There were altogether nine Troys which flourished over a period of 3,200 years, archeologists have declared.

The first was a crude settlement made by this crossroads of the ancient world in the days when mankind first began domesticating animals and crops. The last city perished with the collapse of the Roman empire.

Remains of the seventh city show it was destroyed by fire. The sixth city, which was formerly believed to be the one described in Homer's great epic, was probably destroyed by an earthquake.

FARMINGTON MEN JOIN DAIRY HERD TESTING CLUB

The "Oakland No. 2" D. H. I. A., met in the Board of Commerce Building, Pontiac, March 30th, at 8:00 p. m. for the purpose of organization. A short discussion in which several questions of the members present were cleared up preceded the election of officers.

Mr. E. C. Scheldenhelm, dairy extension specialist from the Michigan State college, pointed out the definite value of D. H. I. A. work to the breeder who is practicing a progressive improvement program. He especially emphasized the primary purpose as being an aid to economical production of the commercial herd. A practical illustration in the other Oakland association was mentioned in which an improved ration suggested by the club had increased the production of the herd 45 per cent.

Rather than letting increased production create a surplus, the low producers in the herd should be culled, reducing the overhead, thereby increasing the profits from the herd. Surplus milk may be separated. The skim milk fed to heifer calves, and the cream sold for practically as much as the milk would bring at surplus price.

Raising replacements for the commercial herd is especially recommended because it greatly reduces the risk of introducing infection.

Additional instances were cited in which the tester can assist the herd owner with his feeding problems.

It was suggested and approved that a temporary president and secretary-treasurer be elected and another meeting to be held in six months after the work is well under way at which time a board of directors will be elected who will choose the officers from their own number.

Mr. Frank Williamson, Pontiac, was elected as president and Frank Lessiter, of Clarkston, secretary-treasurer. A membership fee of \$2.00 was incorporated to purchase new testing equipment.

The rates for testing now in force in the other Oakland association were approved for this association. They are:

Romans Used "X" Chairs
The simple construction of "X" chairs is of great antiquity and their use was known in Europe at a very early date. They somewhat resemble an X if you give your imagination free rein and gracefully curve this letter of the alphabet and place it on its side. It is reported that Henry VIII introduced this type of chair into his Palace of Nonsuch when he brought over continental craftsmen. Some of these chairs were essentially Italian in design, but were undoubtedly made in England, possibly under the direction of Italian craftsmen. A large variety of "X" chairs belong to the Tudor period though they show evidence of strong foreign influence.

"Grub Street" in London
"Grub street" was a street near Moorfields, London, which was inhabited by writers of small histories, dictionaries and temporary poems, and the name was applied to authors of cheap literary products. Employed in a disparaging sense by Andrew Marvell, it was frequently used by Pope, Swift and other wits. The Grub Street Journal, which ended in 1739, was one of the most entertaining of the old newspapers, and contained contributions from the parsons of Pope attacking the Dunces. The street is now named Milton street.
