Learn Nursing At Botsford

Eight Farmington High School students intending to join the medical profession as nurses, nurses aides and possibly doctors someday are getting a first hand introduction into hospital work.

Under the direction of Mrs. Dorothy Burch, RN clinical instructor and co-op coordinator at Farmington High, and with the blessing of Earl Beaumunk, director of

vocational education, the girls are spending 40 hours at Botsford General Hospital over a two-week period.

They're learning a variety of nursing procedures such as bed baths, bed making, feeding patients, care of geriatric and critically ill pre-operative and post-operative care, taking blood pressures, temperatures, pulses and respirations; dietary care and study of nutrition, anatomy and "tender loving care" (TLC, Mrs. Burch calls it).

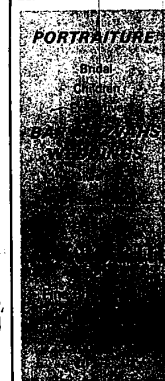

Approve Widening Of Orchard Lake

FARMINGTON The City of Farmington will enter an agreement with Oakland County to widen the intersection of Orchard Lake between the east and west legs of Shiawassee.

Once the widening is completed, a stop and go traffic signal will be installed at Orchard Lake and Shiawassee in an attempt to reduce the high accident incidence at this intersection.

The council instructed Dinan to inform Rep. Raymond Baker (R-64) and Senator Carl Pursell (R-14) of the city's objection to legislation which would renew compulsory arbitration for police and firemen.

Dinan said experience has shown compulsory arbitration encourages lack of collective bargaining and separates police and firemen from other municipal employees.

Councilmen also asked that Pursell and Baker be urged to support action which would give cities a better break on the income tax hike now under consideration by the House of Representatives.

THE CITY and county will participate 50-50 in the cost of the project with the city paying \$16,000.

A base of full-depth asphalt will be added on both sides of Orchard Lake to increase the width of the pavement by 11 feet, from 22 to 33 feet. The widening will add a center lane for turning movements.

The east side of Orchard Lake will be curbed and the west side constructed with shoulder and ditch. The west side will not be curbed because it will be widened further on this side when Orchard Lake is made a four-lane thoroughfare in the future, explained City Manager John Dinan at Monday night's council meeting.

The council voted 5-0 to enter the agreement with the county. The \$16,000 was included in the city's funds for its 1971 major road improvement program.

IN OTHER action, the council agreed to take bids for a garbage truck with a 25-yard load packer, for rubbish removal. The equipment is estimated to cost \$24,000 and will be financed over a four-year period.

The new equipment will increase the city's rubbish load capacity by 50 per cent, said Dinan, and will increase employment of a person to provide a 70,000 mile warranty repair free engine.

The council also voted to authorize Dinan to negotiate employment of a person to coordinate activities for the city's senior citizens.

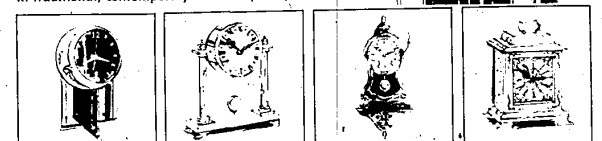

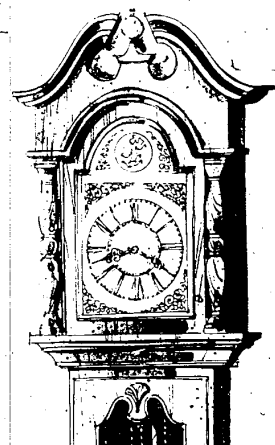
