Parking Lot To Eliminate Congestion

When the free parking lot now being built on Grand River avenue west of 'the Farmington Dairy, is completed, the menace of double parking on Grand River in Farm-ington should be considerably less-ened, possibly eliminated altogeth-

The lot is being re-surfaced with oil and sand and enclosed by wood posts and fencing. It is planned to illuminate the lot with a street lamp placed at the end of the

week.

Although no fatal accident has
occurred on Grand River, in the
Farmington business section due

When the State Highway Commission recently made Grand River the main west-bound highway between Detroit and Lansing one of the requirements imposed upon the City of Farmingston was the elimination of double parking. In order to handle the traffic that will travel through Farmington, therefore, the high-way must be kept clear of double

It is for this purpose that the free municipal parking lot is being constructed. The property is privately awned but is being donated for the use of the city.

Mrs. Talbot Victor In \$400 Suit

Mrs. Eleanor Smith Talbot won a victory in the Circuit Court of Judge H. Russel Holland in Ponjuac Wednesday when a \$400 claim; brought against her by American Historical Society, Inc., was dismissed. The five year old claim rejaulted from the printing of the biography and picture of Charles R. Talbot in The Encyclopedia of American Biography.

In Tablot in The Encyclopedia of American Blography. The plaintiff contended that the money was due them for two coples of the encyclopedia and a steel engraving from which the picture was printed. Mrs. Talbot claimed that she had been III when she signed the contract with the publishers in December, 1931.
