# LOANS MADE IN OAKLAND COUNTY

In Oakland County 327 loans were closed in the amount of \$551,400 by the Federal Land Bank and the Land Bank Commissioner, from May 1, 1933 through June 30, 1936, according, to information received by Abner E. Larned, State Director, National Emergency Council for Michigan.

Of the Ioans closed in Oakland County, 138 for \$458,200 were made by the Federal Land Bank and 189 totaling \$282.200 by the Land Bank Commissioner.

These loans included 14,560 of Federal Land Bank loans for \$33,000,000, 20,857 Land Bank (commissioner loans in the amount of \$23,588,300, 14,531 Froduction Credit Associations totaling \$4,376,556, 17,652 Emergency Crop loans amounting to \$1,299,459 and 4 drought relief loans for \$1,565.
