

## C'ville Plans No Major Cuts For Next Year

Taking the position that it wanted to keep faith with the voters of the school district who have consistently voted to provide tax dollars for the education of their children, the Clarenceville School Board has decided it will continue practically all of its educational programs for the 1971-72 school year.

In effect this means the elementary program will continue to include art, vocal music, instrumental music and physical education.

It was the consensus of the trustees that every effort be made to avoid cutting programs in order to meet rising costs because of inflation and salary demands of employees.

## Job Firm Changes Locations

Over a period of years, he added, Williams Service has evolved from a general office service into specialization in custom printing, duplicating and mailing.

Employees Temporary Service, located at 52 Henry Street in Detroit, has been a Detroit employer since 1948, specializing in supplying temporary blue collar help from its Detroit and suburban offices, including an office at 25165 Grand River in Redford.

CERTAIN positions will be eliminated due to decreasing elementary enrollment and the persons involved have been notified.

The cutbacks include:

- 1-Two assistant principals in the elementary schools.
- 2-Position of creative writing consultant.
- 3-Three elementary classroom teachers and one junior high instructor.
- 4-Reduction in the duties of the athletic director from full time to half-time.
- 5-Position of director of music.

"Generally speaking, the state provides between 35 and 40 per cent of the district's money and until that figure has been established budget-making is a very speculative business. We don't want to be in the position of speculating," McDowell concluded.

## S'craft OKs Maintenance Contract

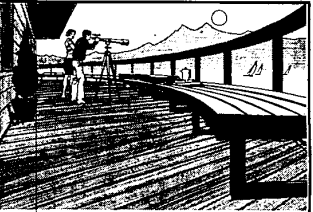
A program to increase the efficiency of custodial operations at Schoolcraft College will get under way on the campus this week after getting the approval of the board of trustees recently.

The Maintenance Optimization Program (MOP) was approved after the college had authorized the Mauchley Management Services to conduct an analysis of custodial operations on the campus.

The analysis showed the need for developing new custodial work schedules and job assignments, in-service training for supervisory and custodial personnel, and for a complete revamping and upgrading of the department.

The college will pay the Mauchley firm \$38,700 for the analysis and the seven-week intensive program. This expenditure was questioned by board members, but administrators said it will save the college money in the long run.

The firm guarantees a savings to the college of at least the \$38,700 within the first year of adopting its recommendations.
