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## Woodbrooke Hills Sets 9 Records

Nine records were set and one tied in Woodbrooke Hills, each contributing their share to the season in the Northwest Suburban Swim League.

Woodbrooke Hills, a private swim club at 13 Mile and Orchard Lake in Farmington Township, won its first meet

over Pleasant Ridge by a 249-209 score but bowed to Livonia C-B club 249-211.

Two relay records were set in the meet with Livonia. A time of 1:08.1 was clocked in the boys combined 40-yard freestyle relay, composed of Dana McCrum, John Yambor

and the Knock brothers, Kirk and Todd.

Girls 64-yard combined relay set a new mark of 2:38.5, each contributing their share were Kathy Taylor, Barb Patek, Ann Bertsch and Jodi Yambor.

Yodi Yambor also set two individual records for Woodbrooke in the 15 to 17 girls division clocking a 29.2 for 50 meters freestyle and 33.2 for 50 meters butterfly.

Bob Dodt set a record in 13 to 14-year-old boys 50 meter butterfly with a time of 33.1 and Sean Falahee set a new 50 meter breaststroke mark of 39.5 also in the boys 13 to 14 division.

Woodbrooke's younger contingent contributed its share of records too. Kirk Knock set a 25-meter backstroke record with a 18.6 as well as tying his older brother Todd's record for the 7

and 8-year-old boys 25-meter freestyle with a time of 18.6. A 9 to 10-year boys 25 meter butterfly record was set by John Yambor with a time of 19.1. Sue Brinkman set an impressive 43.8 for the 11 to 12 girls 50-meter breaststroke in the Livonia meet.
