Michigan Heart Assn. Sponsors Research

LIVONIA A Livonia researcher, Hiroshi Minakami, Ph.D., of 20259 Maplewood, an associate professor of biology at Wayne State University school of medicine, was one of the 63 Michigan researchers who began work recently on Michigan Heart Association financed research. Dr. Gerald M. Breneman, president of the association, announced today. He will do "Studies of Hemoglobin From Cardiovascular Disease Patients."

promotion of research to the deans of the three medical schools and \$21,000 for studies by medical students.

In addition to a total expenditure of \$640,683 in Michigan, the Association will send about \$220,000 to its parent, the American Heart Association, for support of national research. Thus total expenditures will approximate \$860,683.

Dr. Breneman said that as of the end of this fiscal year, June 30, 1972, the Association during its 23 years of life will have spent \$10,047,000 on research.

Using a priority system, the Association's Research Committee selected the 63 projects from among 104 requests. Nineteen additional approved projects could not be funded.

"The Association is emphasizing retrenchment and economy, while simultaneously working to increase its income," said Dr. Breneman. "It is especially important at this time that we try to take up the slack left by government reduction of research support as well as continuing our special function of discovering and encouraging promising young researchers."

THE MICHIGAN UNITED FUND, a disbursing agency for a part of the funds collected by the United Funds in Michigan, supplies about 25 percent of the Association's total income. The remainder is derived from memorial gifts, bequests and the sale of Christmas cards.
