Mrs. Raymond First To File

Getting off to an early start, Mrs. Rosina Raymond was the first person to file petitions for the Schoolcraft College trustee election.

One of the original organizers of the college, Mrs. Raymond, 1906 Oak Drive, Livonia, filed for the six-year at-large trustee seat. Five seats are up in the election, two are two-year terms and three are for six-year terms.

Wife of Livonia City Councilman Jerry Raymond, Mrs. Raymond has demonstrated interest in the college since the time she helped in the drive to get signatures to get the college idea rolling.

When voters in four school districts approved plans for the college, Mrs. Raymond co-chaired the committee to seek one-mill approval from the voters to finance the college.

After the mill was approved, she served on various committees involved with Schoolcraft and attended the first board of trustees meeting

as well as graduation exercises for the first graduating class in 1964.

In 1965, Mrs. Raymond came within 280 votes of winning an at-large seat on the board.

A Livonia resident for 20 years, Mrs. Raymond earned a BA from Wayne State University in 1961 and completed her masters degree from Wayne in 1966.

Currently she is working on a doctorate in speech with cognates in speech sociology, Spanish and German.

Her son, Eldon, is a Livonia resident and a member of the Zoning Board of Appeals. She also has three daughters, one of whom received an associate degree in nursing from Schoolcraft.

She has taught Spanish and speech in the Livonia Public Schools and at Madonna College in Livonia. During more than two years at Madonna, Mrs. Raymond chaired the speech department for a year.

Mrs. Raymond now teaches speech and foreign languages part time at Wayne.

She is the president of the Business and Professional Women of Livonia and the vice president of the Library Commission.

A past vice president of the

School Board Advisory Council, her memberships also include: Rotary, Ann's, Lawyers' Wives, Women of Wayne, Livonia-Redford Theatre Guild, Madison Civic Association, Farmington Universalist, Unitarian Church, American Association of University Professors

and the Citizens for Better Human Relations.

She is also a member of Alpha Kappa Delta, a national sociology honor society, and of Alpha Mu Gamma, a foreign language honor society.
