Notice is hereby given that an
election will be held in the City of
Farmington, County of Oakland
and State of Michigan, on Tuesday
the third day of November, A. D.
1936, from the hour of 7 o'clock
in the forenoon until 8 o'clock in
the evening, Eastern Standard
Time, for the purpose of electing
candidates for the following of-
fices: President and Vice Presi-
dent of the United States, Gov-
ernor, Lieutenant Governor, Secre-
tary of State, Attorney General,
State Treasurer, Auditor General,
Justice of the Supreme Court (to
fill vacancy), for the term ending
December 31, 1943, United States
Senator, Representative in Con-
gress, State Senator, Representa-
tives in the State Legislature,
Judge of Probate, Prosecuting At-
torney, Sheriff, County Clerk, Coun-
ty Treasurer, Register of Deeds,
two Circuit Court Commissioners—
full term ending December 31, 1936,
Drain Commissioner, two Coroners,
and a County Surveyor, as provided
for by Act 351, P. A. 1925, as amend-
ed.

ALSO THE FOLLOWING CON-
STITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS
ARE TO BE VOTED UPON:
PROPOSAL NO. 1
Amendment to permit firearms
and other dangerous weapons
stored outside dwellings, outbuild-
ings and lands adjacent thereto,
to be introduced as evidence in
any criminal procedure.

PROPOSAL NO. 2
Amendment to require laws per-
mitting counties to incorporate;
and, on approval by majorities of
certain specified electors to adopt
a charter.

PROPOSAL NO. 3
Amendment providing for ex-
empting certain articles of food
and prepared meals from the sales
tax.

PROPOSAL NO. 4
An Amendment prohibiting, after
December 31, 1937, all real and
personal property taxes, except to
meet existing indebtedness;
prohibiting new license taxes upon
the ownership, possession or use of
real and personal property; per-
mitting the taxation of income
from property uniformly with other
income; and providing that the
money from income taxes shall be
distributed among local units of
government within the state in a
manner later to be provided by law.
