FARMERS STUDY ADVANTAGES OF ELECTRIC FENCE

Fencing still presents to the average Michigan farmer problems unsolved. Inquiries received by Michigan State College concerning the use of electric fence indicate that this type of fence has made a strong appeal to farmers and stockmen, says D. G. Ebinger, extension specialist in agricultural engineering at the college.

The electric fence carries an electrical current which is imparted as a shock to livestock coming in contact with it. It is no longer necessary to attempt to fence against strength when an electrically charged fence is used. A few contacts with such a fence forces farm animals to respect the single wire.

"There are three general types of electric fence controllers or units available," says Ebinger. "These are the 6 volt and 32 volt direct current units and the 110 volt alternating current controller. The 6 volt units are designed to operate on either dry cell or storage batteries. Observation has shown the 6 volt unit the most practical from the farmer's standpoint. This unit can be moved readily from place to place and the current is much below the accepted limit of danger to stock or humans. The 32 volt direct current controller is designed to operate directly from the batteries of a farm lighting plant.

"The 110 volt alternating current controller was designed for farms having central station service. These alternating current devices have caused most of the objections to electric fencing units. If subjected to a slight breakdown of the controlling unit, quantities of electric energy easily flow onto the fence which greatly exceed the accepted safety standards."

Many Michigan farmers are using electric fence. The chief point of popularity appears to be the low cost and ease with which temporary fences may be erected for pasture rotation. Others find it slows fence jumping and crowding and that it keeps hogs from rooting under wire fences. A Peyton?

THE first known person who used the name of Peyton was Reginald de Peyton, who lived in Norfolk, England, in the Twelfth century. Following him, there were several generations of Peytons in this section of England, who distinguished themselves for their deeds of valor and positions of honor. One of them was the crusader, Sir John de Peyton, who lived in the latter part of the Twelfth century. A later descendant, in 1498, was Sir

Robert de Peyton, high sheriff of England. He married Frances Calthorpe and through them the Peytons claim royal lineage.

Sir Christopher Peyton was Auditor of Ireland during the reign of James I.

Major Robert Peyton, a son of Thomas Peyton, of Rougban county, Norfolk, England, was one of the first Peytons to land on American shores. He came to Virginia in 1670, where he settled, and called his estate "Iselham," from the family home in Cambridgeshire. Major Robert was a loyal supporter of the colonies and was the founder of the Gloucester county (Virginia) Peytons. Colonel Valentine Peyton, also a distinguished Virginia Peyton, was the founder of the Westmoreland and Stafford county branches.

NEW TELEPHONE ALMANAC READY FOR DISTRIBUTION

Among the first almanacs for 1937 to make their appearance is the 10th issue of the Telephone Almanac, which is ready for distribution at the Farmington office of the Michigan Bell Telephone Company, according to R. E. Groves, manager for the company in this area.

Made up, illustrated and printed in the style of the old time almanacs, the Telephone Almanac is highly interesting and attractive both as to contents and appearance. There are shown the usual monthly calendars found in all almanacs, a historical reference; of importance being noted opposite each day of each month. There also are shown the twelve astronomical monthly calendars for the coming year, including the calculations for sunrise and sunset, moonrise and moonset, and the phases of the moon.

Tables of normal temperatures and rainfall data for representative cities in the several states are shown, as are the signs of the zodiac, information as to eclipses during 1937, a statement as to the chronological eras; and other valuable information. Contrasted throughout its pages, are illustrations picturing events and customs of the early years of the nation's history, and scenes from modern times, together with interesting descriptive matter pertaining to both.

There are presented, also twelve historical events in the history of the United States which serve to illustrate the importance of communications in shaping the destiny of the nation and in bringing its several commonwealths together into a single, united national community, together with items relative to the part the telephone has played in bringing America into closer touch with the other nations of the world.

NEW RECORD SET BY CHEVROLET IN NOVEMBER

Chevrolet production for November exceeded that of any previous November in the 25-year history of the company, summaries of official figures revealed this week, with a total of 112,229 cars distributed from the company's factories. Domestic production for the month was 95,022; export production, 12,833; and Canadian production, 4,374. The total was 2,353 more cars than the 108,576 produced in November, 1935, which was the previous record.

At the same time, company officials said, unfilled orders for the new Chevrolet are running ahead of last year, with 96,084 customers' orders still to be met.

Factory production schedules have been stepped up to more than 6,000 cars a day in an effort to keep up with popular demand, with plants working at capacity.

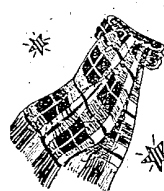

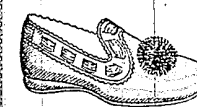
