WILD STEER, ANCIENT CITY

IN 1911, an Irishman named Pat Lynch roped a wild steer in northwestern Colorado. The animal, crazed by the lasso that was tied to the cowboy's saddle horn, dragged horse and rider over the rim of a great chasm. A sturdy pine tree grew on the edge of the cliff and the rope caught around this long enough for Lynch to throw himself clear. His horse hung on one end of the lasso and the steer on the other. Then, as the rope broke under their weight, they plunged into the canyon far below.

Lynch, miraculously enough, landed on a narrow shelf. There was no way for him to escape from the smooth walls that rose steep above him, and below was the chasm. But he slowly worked his way along the shelf until at last he found a ledge just below.

Slowly, he slid down and fell into soft sand. All about him were the ruins of ancient cliff houses. The remains of a man-made trail led around a corner of the rock wall and Lynch climbed to safety.

He told his story, but at that time the cattlemen were not interested in the crumbling bits of an ancient civilization. In 1933, however, a small exploring party went into the region. The government has now reserved this area as the Tampa Canyon national monument.

If Pat Lynch had missed his throw, a slumbering canyon might still be waiting for the white men to discover that ancient city.

PRESIDENT SINK ANNOUNCES MAY FESTIVAL LIST

Kirsten Flagstad and Elizabeth Rethberg, sopranos; Marion Talva, contralto; Arthur Carron and Lauritz Melchior, tenors; Carlos Morelli, baritone; and Ezio Pinza, bass; all stars of the Metropolitan Opera Association; and Eugene List, spectacular young American pianist, and Joseph Knitzer, a young violinist of distinction, have been engaged as soloists for the 1937 May Festival, according to Charles A. Sink, president of the University Musical Society.

Mr. Sink stated that in order to fittingly represent the centennial of the founding of the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, the Musical Society had exerted every effort in assembling a cast of soloists of first magnitude; and for that reason, only soloists of major caliber had been selected. As has been announced previously, the Philadelphia Orchestra of one hundred players under the leadership of Conductors Eugene Ormandy and Jose Hurbi, will participate in all six concerts which will be given on the evenings of May 12, 13, 14 and 15, and on the afternoons of the 14th and 15th.

The general distribution of soloists provides that Madame Flagstad will be heard in miscellaneous operatic arias with orchestra at the opening concert Wednesday night. Lauritz Melchior will be heard in a similar capacity with choral numbers interspersed, on Thursday night. Friday afternoon the Young People's Festival Chorus with Eugene List, pianist, will make their contribution. Juva Higbee and either Mr. Ormandy or Mr. Hurbi will conduct.

At the traditionally brilliant artist concert Friday evening, Elizabeth Rethberg, soprano, and Ezio Pinza, bass, will contribute operatic solo numbers and duets; with Mr. Ormandy conducting. Saturday afternoon a symphony concert will be given, with Mr. Hurbi conducting. Joseph Knitzer, violinist, will appear as soloist. Saturday evening, Verdi's "Aida" will be sung by the Choral Union under the baton of Earl V. Moore. Madames Rethberg and Talva will participate; and also Arthur Carron, tenor; Carlos Morelli, baritone; and Ezio Pinza, bass.
