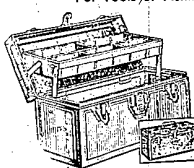

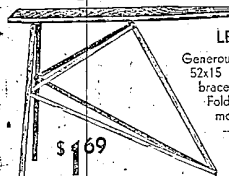

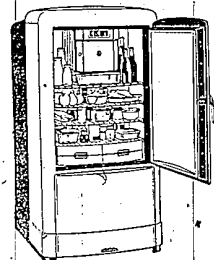

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Points Out Need For School Aid

"A public school building program in Michigan for the next five years estimated to cost \$26,000,000 is essential if schools are going to serve the people adequately," Dr. Eugene B. Elliott, state superintendent of public instruction, declared in advocating a legislative appropriation of \$47,000,000 for schools.

At a recent meeting of the Michigan Advisory Commission on Education, it was pointed out that from 1923 to 1928 the sum of \$116,900,000 was spent in the state for construction of new school buildings. During the last five years less than \$10,000,000 has been raised by school districts for this purpose, although several districts secured federal aid in this regard.
